Receipts of winter wheat at the principal markets totaled 762 cars compared with 1,395 cars last week and 536 cars a year ago. Most of the arrivals at Kansas City were applied on previous sales. At the close of the market May 3, No. 2 hard winter wheat ordinary protein was quoted at Kansas City at \$1.01 to \$1.03. Premiums on cash wheat were lowered about 1c per bushel at Chicago despite a sharp reduction in receipts. No. 2 hard winter was quoted nominally at \$1.04 per bushel.
