OTHER WORLDS THAN OURS
(By Wickliffe R. Smith)
If you look toward the west about dark you will see the most beautiful star in the sky. This brilliant planet is Venus—the twin sister of the earth. But when you look at it can you realize that you are looking at a world very similar to the earth and of almost the same size? Can you imagine the inhabitants of Venus—if there are any—looking at our earth and calling it the most beautiful star in the heavens? Well, whether you can think of it in that way or not, that is, perhaps, exactly what they do. Venus receives more light and heat from the sun than the earth does; but it has no moon to "light up" the night.
On Sunday evening, May 5, Venus was less than one degree south of the moon just after sunset. Though they appeared very close together at that time, they were, in fact, far apart. If we could stand on the moon and look at Venus, that beautiful world would seem no nearer than it does from here, but to the people on Venus, the moon and earth form a pretty picture as they revolve about each other in their journey around the sun.
At about 10 o'clock p. m. you can see another bright red star near the meridian, about a third of the way down from the zenith toward the southern horizon. This is Mars, a world that has been studied more intensely by astronomers than any other of the planets.
After you have studied Mars for a time, look over toward the southeast and you will see Jupiter, the giant of the solar system. This great world is second only to Venus in brilliance. It is indeed a giant, being 1,400 times as large as the earth. Mars and Jupiter are gradually getting closer to each other, and by the latter part of August they will be very close together in the sky.
North and east of Mars is another bright red star—almost as bright as Mars itself. This is Arcturus, a distant sun many times larger than our own sun. While a radio message would travel around the earth more than seven times in a second—to the moon in less than two seconds—and to the sun in eight minutes—yet Arcturus is so far away that more than forty years would be required for a radio message to make the trip. It is quite probable that Arcturus has many worlds revolving about it just as the earth revolves around the sun.

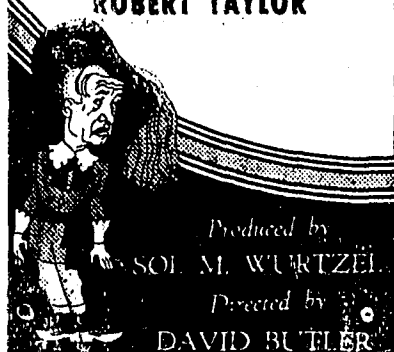
