Notice To The Public

State regulations Liquor Control Act, Chapter 103, 1935 session laws. Section 35—No person shall open a package containing liquor or consume liquor in a public place (public place includes any place, building, conveyance or public road to which the public is permitted to have access.) Every person who violates any provision of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Chapter 132, 1935 Session Laws—Beer Control Act: Section 6—(Unlawful practices). 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell beer to any minor under the age of eighteen years.

County Beer Ordinance—Section 4: There shall be no sale of beer to any individual who shall appear to be intoxicated and the violation of such provision is specifically made a ground for revocation of retail license of the violator.

**FURTHER SHARP DECLINES
FEATURE GRAIN MARKETS**

of the week, 13 per cent protein blue-stem hard white was quoted at Portland at 91c, ordinary bluestem hard white at 87c. At Seattle, western white, western red and hard winter were quoted at 74c, and baart hard white at 90c per bushel, sacked, No. 1 basis.


California markets were dull with local millers and feed manufacturers purchasing only sufficient wheat for immediate needs and awaiting new crop offerings to accumulate stocks. The San Francisco market declined about 5c per 100, with the slow flour business and increased substitution of barley for feed wheat, weakening influences. Receipts at San Francisco during May totaled 12,805 tons, bringing the season's total to 75,323 tons, of which 48,818 tons were northern wheat.

Foreign wheat markets were unsettled and mostly lower. Prices at Winnipeg declined more than 4c with No. 1 Manitoba northern quoted May 31 at 81¼c.

Oats markets declined sharply, principally influenced by the weakness in other grains, favorable prospects for the new crop and a dull demand for current offerings. Pacific Northwestern markets were quiet with occasional car to local mixers and to the middle-west from eastern Washington. Middlewestern markets tended downward with other grains, favorable prospects for the new crop and a light inquiry for current offerings. At the close of the market May 29, No. 3 white oats were quoted at Minneapolis at \$1.08¼ to \$1.11¼.

Pacific Northwestern barley markets were sharply lower toward the end of the week, reflecting the weakness in other grains and the favorable outturn of the California crop. Trading and movement continued extremely light with mixed feed manufacturers furnishing the principal outlet for the market offerings. At the close of the market May 29, No. 2 bright western barley was quoted at Portland at \$1.27½ with California feed barley at \$1.10 per 100, sacked basis.
