In his annual report to Secretary Wallace, Chester C. Davis, AAA administrator asserted that restricted production will not be the focal point of a permanent policy for agriculture, The report covered activities of the AAA from February 15 to December 31, 1934. Davis said that problems of agricultural adjustment "have changed as the pressure of emergency has lessened," and declared "there is opportunity now to replace temporary measures appropriate only to extraordinary conditions, with an agricultural policy looking forward toward long-view objectives." Use of referendum methods of obtaining opinions of the farmers toward adjustment programs was said by Davis to have been one of the most significant developments of the year. 


