ATTY. GENERAL TAYLOR WRITES OF STATE PROBLEMS

The way in which state business is sometimes conducted is enlightening — from the inside. Its practices occasionally seem well calculated to illustrate the time-honored expression "passing the buck." This was, in a measure, exemplified during the current year.

A statute was passed by the 1937 legislature, taxing producers for the purpose of carrying out what is known as the Fruit and Vegetable Advertising Act, by which a levy is made upon growers of potatoes, onions, apples and prunes throughout the state to pay for an advertising campaign. This is a very laudable purpose and if lawfully operated would probably result in greatly increased profits to the growers. I know of no person who is not in favor of the general object of the law, though many appear to oppose the statute because they consider it either unfair or invalid for various reasons.

Shortly after the close of the legislature, the Commissioner of Agriculture sent a request to the Attorney General's office for an interpretation of the statute in question. The Attorney General, like any lawyer, first investigated to determine whether or not the statute really was a law, and decided that it was not valid for various reasons. He thereupon so advised the Commissioner, and suggested that a friendly suit be brought at once to determine the question as early as possible so that the question of validity might not interfere with the program in case the courts upheld the law. This suggestion, however, was ignored and the Commissioner proceeded to administer the law, correctly thinking that he had the right to disregard the Attorney General's opinion and assume any responsibility that might arise if the law was not good.

Matters continued thus until somewhere towards the end of August, at which time a small expedition of farmers from Canyon County, numbering somewhere between thirty and forty, called upon the Attorney General and advised him that they intended to bring an action to prevent further operation of the law. Deeming such action likely to result in long drawn out litigation, I called the Commissioner of Agriculture and Carl DeLong, his co-worker, to meet with the farmers and discuss the situation. This was done, and it was decided to bring the above mentioned test suit at that late date. The State Auditor and Secretary of State were called in and it was agreed that the Auditor should refuse to pay one of the Commissioner's claims and that the latter would thereupon bring suit to compel payment and that the Attorney General should defend. This was arranged, the Commissioner secured an attorney, brought suit and the matter was submitted without delay to the district court. After some delay, resulting from the particular time at which the suit was brought, the court upheld the law, but for about two months after the suit was filed, matters were held up pending the court's decision.

Effort has been made to cast the burden for the suit and the consequent delay upon the Attorney General's office, and much misinformation has been disseminated for that purpose. The fact remains, however, that had the Attorney General's suggestion been followed, and a friendly suit started to test the validity of the law last spring, a decision would have been made before the time for beginning an advertising campaign, and there would have been no delay whatever. This office was very willing to cooperate in every way so that the advertising campaign could get started and continue without interruption and had that course been adopted, the program could have been carried forward from the time the advertising season opened. The delay was caused by the refusal of those putting on the campaign to cooperate earlier in the year when invited to do so.

WHEAT MARKETS REMAIN WEAK WITH SLOW DEMAND

Wheat markets lost further ground during the week ending on November 26, but corn held firmer. Other grains held about unchanged.

The general wheat situation remained weak, influenced by continued weakness in securities markets, limited export trade, increased offerings of new Australian wheat and some improvement in prospects in Argentine. Despite light southern hemisphere shipments and prospects of relatively small surpluses both in Argentina and Australia, inquiry for Canadian and United States wheat continued dull. Argentine shipments amounted to only 128,000 bushels and Australian shipments to 978,000 bushels, while 2,312,000 bushels, including 1,680,000 bushels of Russian wheat were shipped.

Intermountain and Pacific Coast markets reflected the unsettled conditions in eastern markets. At the close of the week, Denver mills were bidding 80c per bushel for No. 2 hard winter and No. 2 hard spring, FOB Colorado common points, with millers at Ogden offering 66c per bushel FOB Utah-Idaho common points for No. 2 soft, hard white, northern spring and hard winter and 70c for No. 2 dark northern spring and No. 2 dark hard winter.

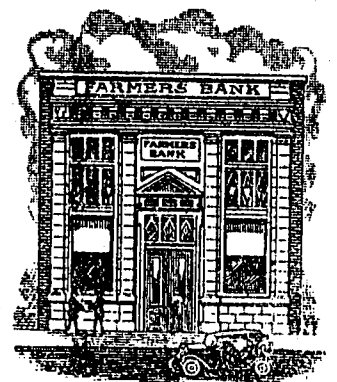

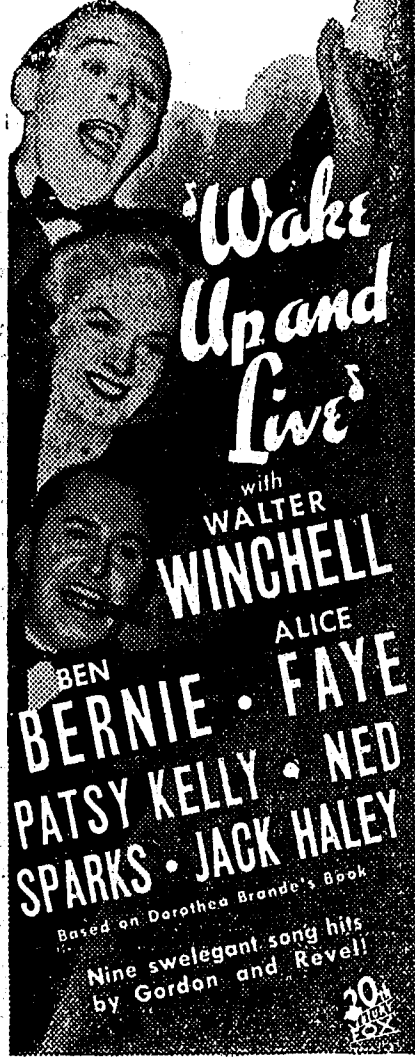
