## ATTY. GENERAL TAYLOR WRITES OF STATE PROBLEMS

The method of enacting laws is definitely prescribed by statute, and great care is exercised in order that the laws passed by the legislature shall appear accurately upon the statute books. In spite of this precaution however, inaccuracies sometimes appear in the transcribing of these laws with the occasional result that the real intent of the legislature is frustrated. An example is found by comparison of Sections 59-622 and 59-623, Idaho Code Annotated. The first provides that no public utility shall raise rates, tolls or rentals under any circumstance whatever, except upon a showing before the commission and finding by the commission that such increase is justified. The second section provides that when any schedule increasing rates, tolls or rentals is filed with the commission, such schedule shall become effective in 30 days after being filed. These two statutes were called in question before the Idaho Supreme court in the case of Mountain View Rural Telephone company vs. Interstate Utilities commission. Investigation and inquiry from the members of the legislature show that when the latter statute appeared as a bill, the word "not" was used before the word "increasing". The bill was traced through the legislature records up to the time of its passage and this word "not" was never removed by amendment and was included in the bill as finally passed. Yet somehow or other, whether inadvertently and unintentionally, I do not presume to say, the final bill as signed by the Governor, did not contain the said word "not" and the result was that the two statutes contradicted each other. In its consideration of the case, the Supreme court held that the word "not" was intended by the legislature to remain in the bill as finally passed and held that it should be there in order to remove the contradiction and give force and effect to both statutes.

Another illustration of the same thing is to be found in Section 36-1321 Idaho Code Annotated, which reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, companies or corporations aforesaid to slaughter any animals between the hours of 8 a. m. and 4 p. m. unless by special permission of the Department of Public Welfare."

Inquiry was made of the Attorney General's office as to the reason for preventing the slaughter of animals between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m. No reason could be found for such an absurd provision and recourse was again had to the legislative records and the members of the legislature, and it was found that the bill as passed by the legislature provided that no animals should be slaughtered "except between the hours of 8 a. m. and 4 p. m.", so that the bill as presented to the Governor for signature conveyed exactly the opposite meaning from the bill which was passed. Apparently the purpose of the legislature was to regulate the slaughter of animals that it would be done in the daytime when inspection or observation would be easiest. One can hardly imagine that cattle and sheep thieves were able to bring about the omission of the word "except" and make the slaughter of such animals only in the night time when detection would be difficult, if not impossible.

However, these changes were made, and I assume that they were entirely accidental.

The two illustrations given above indicate how easy it is for the will of the people to be defeated, even when their representatives in the legislature have written down in unmistakable terms just what they intended the law to be, and to illustrate further the fact that eternal vigilance is the price of good government.

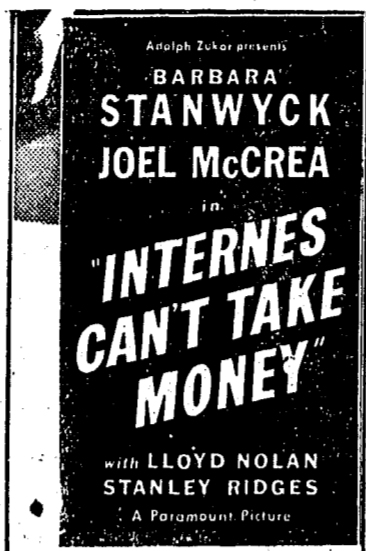

### Mushlitz Gives REA Rates

Moscow.—A. R. Mushlitz, REA project superintendent, pointed out that there had been some confusion as to charges to be made for electricity furnished by the rural farm lines.

"The tentative rate, as set up by the REA, is a minimum charge of \$4 for the first 40 kilowatt hours; the next 40 kilowatt hours at 4 1/2c per kilowatt hour used; the next 120 kilowatt hours at 2 1/2c per kilowatt hour used and all over 200 kilowatt hours of energy at 1 1/2c per kilowatt hour used," said Mr. Mushlitz.

"This charge includes all retirement of debt, interest on the debt, maintenance, operation, and, in fact, all expenses incidental to construction, operation, and maintenance of an electric power system," concluded the superintendent.

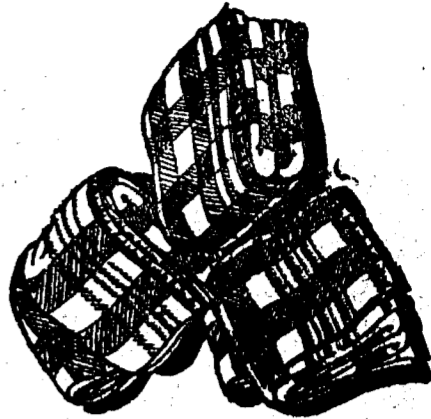
