WHEAT CONTINUES DE-CLINE-FEEDS STEADY

Wheat markets continued to decline during the second week in March, influenced by only a moderate demand, further improvement in crop prospects, continued heavy ing to the Weekly Grain Market ley were barely steady and trading

in these grains was rather slow. Further weakness developed in the general wheat situation and prices at Liverpool declined to the lowest point in the current season. United States and Canadian markets were at the lowest level since early November. Contributing to the weakness were move favorable prospects for the new winter wheat crop. The condition of winter wheat is generally good throughout Europe and moisture conditions have continued to improve in North America. While dust storms occurwestern Oklahoma, the moisture The accident occurred on the situation improved materially in sippi river. Winter wheat made good progress from the Dakotas southward and growth is sufficient to furnish some pasturage in southeastern Kansas and most of Okla-

homa. Marketings of spring wheat were only moderate with 301 cars received at Minneapolis and 113 cars at Duluth. Current demand was irregular but showed some improvement toward the close of the week as flour trade increased.

Canadian markets reflected the weakness at Liverpool and declined about 2½c. Trading was more active toward the close of the week with renewed foreign trade. At the close of the week No. 3 Manitoba northern was quoted at \$1.1414.

In parts of the upper Mississippi valley and northern great plains, moderate to heavy precipitation was beneficial, especially in southern Minnesota and eastern South Dakota where conditions have been considerably improved with the moisture going into the soil with very little runoff.

Intermountain and Pacific Coast markets were also weak and lower. The Portland market was rather irregular with some classes slightly higher and others as much as per bushel lower, depending on the local supply and demand situation. Receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals increased to 913 cars but current offerings at all country points were light. Prices at Portland were too high to induce trading with central western or Atlantic Coast markets and sales to California were light. Demand from local mills was only moderate and export trade provided the principal outlet. Export sales, however, during the week were estimated at only 3,000 tons, all of white wheat. At the close of the week soft white. western white, western red and hard white (baart) were all quoted at 88c and hard red winter at 89c per bushel, all basis No. 1 grade,

sacked. Pacific Northwestern barley markets were dull with inquiry for feeding barley very light but lack of selling pressure tended to hold prices about steady. Inquiry for malting barley was also light and prices tended downward. No. 2 bright western barley weighing 45 pounds per bushel, was quoted at Portland March 10, at \$1.40 per 100, sacked.

Pacific Northwestern oats markets were quiet with trading limited and No. 2 white oats were quoted at Portland at \$1.30 per 100 and No. 2 gray oats at \$1.40 per 100, sacked basis. The market for gray oats was somewhat more active at country points, reflecting the good demand for seed oats.




