Physics Field Trip  
The physics class, accompanied by their instructor, J. M. Lyle, Jr., took a trip to Lewiston Monday afternoon and went through the W. W. generating plant at the dam.

The power dam is about half a mile below the mill dam. The reason is because water pressure and flow can be more easily controlled from the mill pond than from the river. The guide first took us on top of the dam where we were shown the intake for the two immense generators. The openings for the intakes were grided, that is, bars of steel about 2 1/2 inches apart were run up and down across the opening. These grides kept out such trash as railroad ties, logs, etc., but little things like 2x4's, axe handles and the like went through with no ill effects. The larger trash was steered into a chute and sent down the river through the dam. There were two intakes, one for each generator, and each intake had a huge gate valve which could be lowered by means of a big derrick. This shut off the water from its particular generator, stopping it and permitting a man to enter for inspection.

We went down to the ground floor from here, where the cages for the big out-door generators were. At one side of the cage is an opening for cooling air. This air is thoroughly washed and cooled by a continuous spray of water at the mouth of the opening. It then passes through the enormous bearings and through the oil conveyors to cool the lubricating oil.

Next we were shown into the motor room. Here were oil pumps to force oil to bearings, air pumps to force oil to stop the generators in case of emergency, and water pumps for the air-cleaner mentioned before. In the control room are the switches, meters, etc., for control of the machinery and current.

Another room adjoining the control room is called the "exciter room." Here three small direct-current generators are run by electric motors. These generators are to furnish the direct current for the field magnets in the main generators.

## CAVENDISH FARM USED IN EROSION CONTROL

That soil and water conservation through erosion control is a practice that will put money into the public coffers and more than repay the individual for his efforts is the contention of Roy LeBaron, county commissioner of Clearwater County, Idaho.

Mr. LeBaron, who operates a 384-acre wheat farm at Cavendish, Idaho, is cooperating with the soil conservation service and the Idaho state extension service in establishing a demonstrational erosion control program on his farm.

Technicians of the soil conservation service project at Moscow, working with Mr. LeBaron and George Johnson, county agent at Orofino, recently completed a detailed plan for erosion on LeBaron's farm. Consisting of a soil and slope map, cropping plans for each field, and an outline of proper land use to check soil and water losses, the complete farm plan will be a guide to future operations.

The plan for Mr. LeBaron's farm provides for the retirement of thin-soiled and steeply sloping fields to alfalfa and grass, use of sweet clover in a rotation which eventually will cover the entire farm, seeding out of waterways in crop land to alkali and grass, stubble utilization and rough tillage on all cultivated land, and an improved plan of woodland management.

Erosion control plans for a number of farmers outside existing soil conservation projects and camp areas are under way at the present time, according to Leo Anderson, conservationist at the Moscow project office. This phase of the program is designed to carry soil and water saving measures to districts out of reach of present demonstration areas, he pointed out.

**Juliaetta Cheers Railway Decision.**  
Juliaetta citizens welcomed the word received from the Northern Pacific Railway company, by the chairman of the village council, that the petition for abolishment of the Juliaetta depot has been withdrawn, and the hearing on the proposal set for March 29 by the state public utilities commission had been cancelled.

After a thorough investigation it was found there is business enough to justify the retention of the depot service. The depot was built in 1893 and for ten years was the end of the Palouse branch of the Northern Pacific railway. When the Nez Perce Indian reservation was opened for settlement the road was extended to Lewiston.

Within the last three years Juliaetta has increased in population about 20 per cent and nearly all houses are now occupied.

Juliaetta is at present out of debt and has quite a bank account. The streets are being improved by grading and some are to be graveled.

## WHEAT MARKETS CONTINUE WEEK, FEED GRAINS STEADY

Domestic wheat markets declined further during the week ending on March 25, influenced by only a moderate milling inquiry, slow export demand and generally favorable new crop prospects, according to the Weekly Grain Market Review of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Oats and barley were barely steady, but choice malting barley sold very readily at good premiums.

Crop prospects and political developments abroad remained the dominant influences in the general wheat situation. United States winter wheat prospects continued to improve and spring wheat seedings started at the earliest date in many years. Crop conditions remained generally satisfactory in Europe.

Harvesting in India made rapid progress with good yields reported. Influenced by these developments and some relaxation in the European political tensions, the Liverpool market declined to a new low for the season but turned somewhat firmer as Australian offers slackened and southern hemisphere shipments decreased.

The Portland market declined 1 1/2c to 2c per bushel with practically no export trade and slow domestic milling inquiry. Milling demand, however, showed some improvement toward the close of the week as a result of better flour business. No export sales were reported and practically no Northwestern wheat moved to California or eastern markets.

Sales of flour to the Philippines totaled over 13,000 barrels with the indemnity payment reported at 10c per barrel. At the close of the week No. 1 soft and western white wheats was quoted at Portland at 85 1/2c, with hard white (baart) at 83 1/2c and hard red winter at 87 1/2c per bushel, all basis No. 1 grade, sacked. At Seattle, western white and western red were quoted at 85c, hard winter at 84c, hard white (baart) at 85c.

Pacific Northwestern barley markets were quiet, reflecting the slow demand for the small offerings. No. 2 bright western barley held steady at Portland at \$1.40 per 100, sacked.

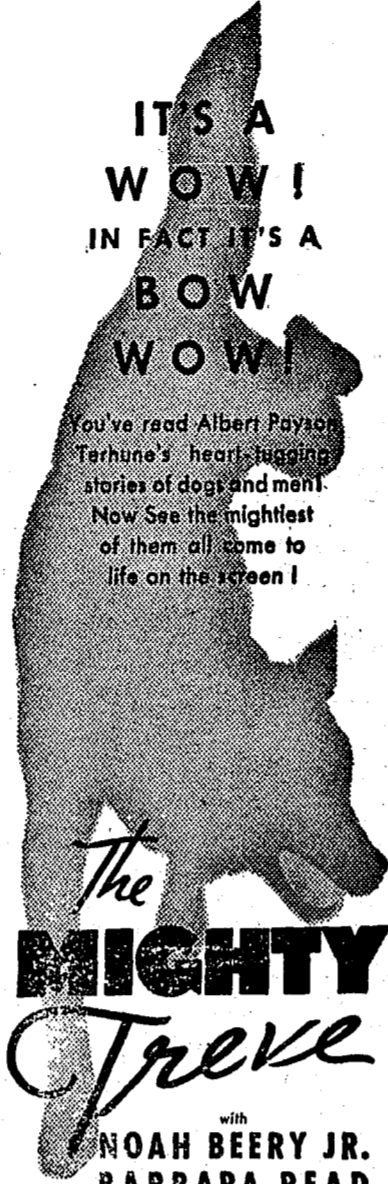
