DAHLQUIST, PIANO TUNER, FOUND IN RIVER

Apparently a suicide, the body of Dahlquist, pioneer piano tuner and the Troy section of the community was taken from the Potlatch river, near the baseball diamond Tuesday afternoon by Corporal Short and Deputy Sheriff Gordon.

The body, only a portion of the face showing above the water, was discovered by Gifford Candler Tuesday morning. Mr. Candler, not being a diver, called a candy-bar man, partially obscured the face, and E. A. Deobald, who with field glasses, confirmed Candler's belief that it was a piano tuner. Sheriff Summerfield was called and the removal made about the meantime, Geo. Leith and Lloyd Millard had gotten to the body by going below and wading in the rocky bar on which the body was lodged. Both knew Dahlquist and identified the body as his.

Dahlquist disappeared from his room the night of March 24. He is said to have been drinking heavily and in his drunken condition it is not known whether the death was accidental or suicide. He was well known in this entire section following his trade for the past two years. Troy is said to have been his home some years ago, then moved to and later Seattle. He is said to have owned a piano store in both Troy and Moscow at one time. Two daughters and a son, all in Seattle, are believed to have survived him, his wife having passed away some two years or more ago. Really definite information regarding him is lacking.

The body was taken to Moscow following its removal from the water. Its disposition has not as yet been learned.

Summer Round-Up

The primary objectives of the Summer Round-Up are prevention of contagious communicable diseases through immunization; prevention of damage to health by the removal of foci of infection in the teeth, tonsils and other parts; prevention of serious consequences of eye and eye defects by proper corrective measures; prevention of malnutrition through proper eating habits and removal of defects, and the prevention of undesirable mental traits and behavior patterns through proper training.

The Summer Round-Up campaign cannot of course, prevent all of these defects through periodic campaigns that require constant vigilance and effort. But it will at least stimulate an interest in that direction and encourage parents to use the measures available which will safeguard the life and health of children in this important age period. The advance made in recent years in the conservation of child health may be attributed in part, at least, to the efforts of parent-teacher associations. The Summer Round-Up has been a definite part in this movement and in making the nation conscious of the need for special consideration of the pre-school age group. That work must go on until all parents grasp its significance. Parents who apply themselves intelligently to the task of guiding and protecting their children during the formative period as well as in later years will be rewarded for their efforts for the early years are most significant in the growth and development of children.

John Alvin Nye was born June 30, 1880, at Bozeman, Montana, and passed away March 27, at his home at Metairie Falls, Wash. He is survived by one brother, Fred Nye, Juliaetta, and four half brothers, Walter Groves of Bellingham, Wn.; Roy Groves of Beverly, Wash.; Geo. Groves of Juliaetta and Homer Groves of Nevada, besides several nieces and nephews.

He followed mining until recent years, and of late has been associated with and made his home with Thomas Daugherty and wife of Metairie Falls.

Mr. Nye first came to Juliaetta in 1893, leaving there when about 15 years of age.

Funeral services were conducted from the U. B. church at Juliaetta, with the Rev. Geo. Calvert in charge, on Wednesday afternoon, March 30, at 2 o'clock with interment in the Juliaetta cemetery. Songs were by Mrs. W. Grantham, Mrs. W. Cochran and E. Taylor, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. M. C. Halliday.

KENDRICK P. O. SELLS MANY GOVERNMENT BONDS

A final tabulation of sales of government bonds in the state of Idaho has been completed, giving the ranking position of the different classes of offices within the state. Among the nine first-class post-offices of the state, Lewiston ranks first in sales of baby bonds for the period from September 1, 1936, through August 31, 1937—a per capita sale of \$14.90 for the patrons of the office.

Of the third-class postoffices of the state, which includes Potlatch, Kendrick, Kamiah and Troy, Kendrick was in second place with a sale of \$21,918.00, as against \$27,487 for Potlatch, which stood in first place. Kamiah was third with \$13,743 and Troy fourth with \$9,000.

The top per capita sale in each postoffice class was: Lewiston, \$14.90; St. Maries, \$45.42; Kendrick, \$60.38, and Leesburg, in Lemhi county, \$187.50.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau has announced that the total maturity value of United States savings bonds sold through the close of business March 7, 1938, amounted to \$1,584,462,875. This total was purchased by more than 1,260,000 investors and represents an average sale for each business day since March 1, 1935, when these bonds were first sold, of \$1,720,375.

GREENES CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

Mr. and Mrs. T. O. Greene celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary at their Juliaetta home on April 1.

Thomas O. Greene and Fanny Wingham were married at Lowell, Arkansas, April 1, 1888, the first day of the week—the first day of the month—All Fool's Day—Easter Sunday. It was reported at that time that Easter would not fall on April 1 again for 150 years.

Of the 50 or more people who were at the wedding that day Mr. and Mrs. Greene know of, only four are still living—two brothers and two sisters of Mrs. Greene, Dr. M. A. and W. M. Wingham and Mrs. Lilly Keitner of Seattle and Mrs. Katie Keeton of Edmonds, Wash.

Mr. Greene came from his home near Prairie Grove, Ark., in March of 1886. He had been attending the Springdale Academy, and after the closing of school left for the west as many of the young men were doing in those days.

For nearly two years, after his arrival in Whitman county, Washington, he taught in the public schools of that county. He was teaching at Oakesdale, Wash., when the Northern Pacific railway was being constructed from Spokane to Moscow, and he saw the first train come in Oakesdale.

In December of 1887 Mr. Greene returned to his home in Arkansas, remained until September, 1888, when he and his bride came to Bellevue, Idaho, then on to Creighton, on the Big Camas Prairie, in old Alturas county in southern Idaho. Mr. Greene taught in the public schools of that county until September of 1900, when they moved to Oakesdale, Wash.

For several years they moved from place to place, wherever Mr. Greene would be teaching school. Some of the places where he taught were Farmington, Wash., Wallace, Troy and Moscow, Idaho. In 1909 Mr. Greene was elected to the principalship of the Juliaetta schools and Mrs. Greene was to teach the primary grade.

Here they bought a home and have since resided.

After one year in the Juliaetta schools Mr. Greene entered the employ of the Lewiston Tribune Publishing company as the company's field representative.

He continued in this position until ill health forced him, in 1934, to resign, after 26 years of service to the company. He was 72 years old March 24.

Mrs. Greene taught in the Juliaetta schools for eight years, after which she served as a member of the school board for over 10 years. Mr. and Mrs. Greene had only two children, daughters—Eula and Amsel—Eula Greene Miller and her three children live in Juliaetta, where she is teacher of the primary grades in the Juliaetta schools. Amsel Greene is a teacher in the high school at Helena, Montana, a position she has had for the past seven years.

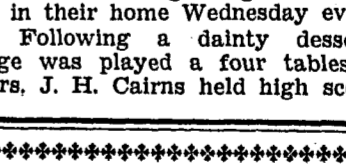
