WHEAT MARKET STEADY DESPITE LARGE FORECAST

Domestic wheat markets maintained a firm tone during the week ended May 13, despite forecasts of a large winter wheat crop and a favorable prospect for spring wheat, says the Weekly Grain Market Review of the Bureau of Agricultural Eco-nomics. Oats were steady but barley

was somewhat weaker. Intermountain and Pacific Coast markets were influenced by local conditions. Mills at Denver were bidding 64c per bushel FOB Colorado shipping points for No. 2 hard winter and No. 2 northern spring. Mills at Ogden advanced bids 1c per bushel and offered 57c for No. 2 soft white, 55c for No. 2 hard white and 54c for No. 2 northern spring and hard winter FOB Utah-Idaho

common points. Prices at Portland ranged from 1c higher to 1c lower with soft white sacked. Receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals totaled 634 cars, a large portion of which represented the movement to terminals of wheat held at country points by millers and exporters. Export trade provided the principal outlet for current offerings since milling inquiry was very slow. Export sales totaled around 10,000 tons according to trade reports.






