July 1, 1937—June 30, 1938

School children, numbering 9,000,000, enrolled in Junior Red Cross for service.

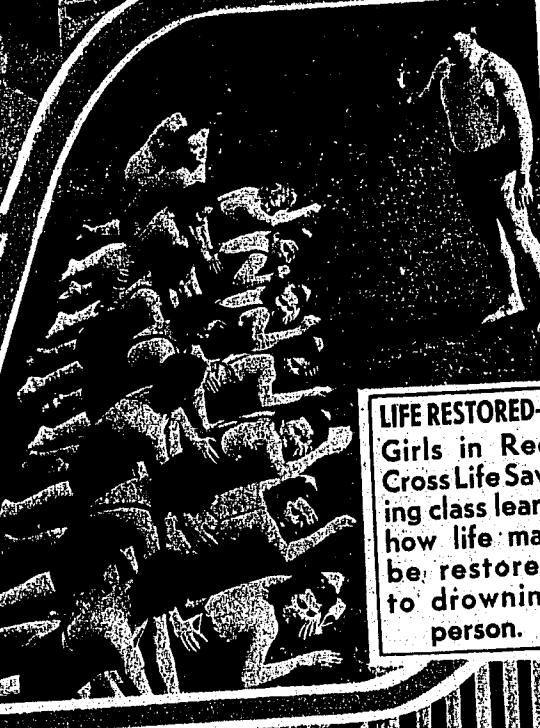

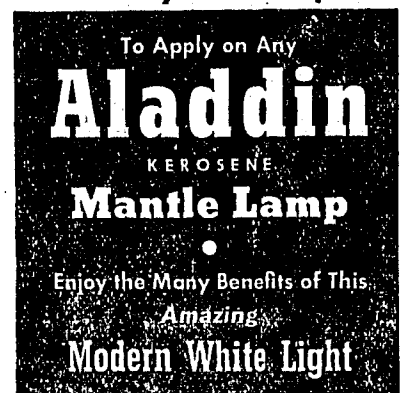
