Car Condition Big Item
With the approach of winter, the condition of your car has a lot more to do with safe driving than in the summer, for snow, ice and mud in this section are noted for their slipperiness. Fog, too, adds a touch of real danger to the situation.

Every motorist should check over his car carefully for winter driving. Lights should be tested and put in perfect condition, brakes should be carefully checked and carefully set so that all four wheels work alike. Tail lights should be checked to see that they are burning, and stop lights also put in working order, for on cold winter days hand signals are less apt to be used even by the careful driver.

Tires, too, should receive attention. A smooth, worn-out tire slips

far more easily than one with a new, rough tread. Chains should be carried at all times and used when needed. Their price is inconsequential when a human life is at stake, or for that matter, even a fender.

A clean windshield is a real aid to winter safety. A number of different types of defrosting fans, heater attachments and chemically treated wiper blades are available at reasonable prices. Don't look through a "peek-hole" in your windshield when a small amount will enable you to see clearly. Good fog lights of amber or orange colored lenses are a real aid in fog or snow. They, too, are obtainable at reasonable prices.

If you don't consider your own safety, consider the life of the other fellow. He has a right to live and enjoy life as well as yourself.

Industrial Accidents Drop

A total of 746 claims of injury were filed with the State Insurance Fund during the month of October, is the report of Paul Black, safety director for the fund. There were four fatal accidents during the month, one clerical office employee, one outside salesman, one bridge carpenter and one logger.
Injuries to garage mechanics totaled 60, miners 41, truck and transfer employees, 35 and restaurant employees 33. Combined road and street construction and repairs reported 64. Clips and falls were the greatest cause of injury, with hands and fingers in the majority.
