WHEAT MARKET COTINUES WEAK-ABUNDANT SUPPLY

Wheat markets continued weak during the week ended November 25, reflecting abundant supplies and relatively slow demand, states the Weekly Grain Market Review of the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Feed grains, on the other hand, were steady to firm with cold weather tending to reduce market-

ings and increase feed requirements.

Test weight was the principal grading factor in spring wheat east of the Rocky mountains, since rust infestation and drought in western sections of North and South Da-kota caused much shrunken wheat. Ninety-eight per cent of the inspected receipts August through October classified as dark northern spring but only 49 per cent graded No. 2 or better. Pacific Northwestern hard red spring wheat compared forwardly with the 1927 crep. Dufavorably with the 1937 crop. Durum wheat is of exceptionally high

quality this year. Pacific Northwest cash wheat markets were weak and prices at Portland declined 1c to 11/2c per bushel compared with the previous week. On Nov. 25 soft white and western white were quoted at Portland at 62c per bushel, western red at 61c and hard red winter at 58c per bushel, all basis No. 1 grade in bulk. Five hundred thirty-five carlots of wheat were received at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals during the period. Mill de-mand was only moderate and business to California was slow. Flour sales to the Philippines under the indemnity plan were 7,225 barrels, 10,165 general and 56,875 barrels to China. The indemnity Nov. 25 was \$1.00 per barrel to China, 70c to the Philippines and 75c general from Pacific Coast ports. Trade reports indicate two cargoes of Pacific Northwest wheat were sold to Shanghai during the past week. At Seattle western white was quoted at 61c, western red at 60c, hard winter at 59c and hard white at 62c per bushel.




