MARKETS SEASONALLY DULL -PRICES ABOUT UNCHANGED

Domestic grain markets continued seasonally dull during the week ended December 22, states the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in the Weekly Grain Market Review. Wheat held firm, influenced by light offerings and prospects of a relatively small crop of winter wheat next season. Oats and barley were firm but prices remained about unchanged over the week.

The outstanding feature in the domestic wheat situation was the official estimate showing a sharp reduction in winter wheat acreage and continued unfavorable new crop prospects. The area sown last fall estimated at 46,173,000 acres, or about 18 per cent below the 56,-355,000 acres seeded in the fall of 1937.
