MARKET'S SEASONALLY DULL —PRICES ABOUT UNCHANGED

December 23, soft white wheat was quoted at Portland at 66 1/2c, western white 66 1/2c, western red at 65c, hard red winter at 63 1/2c and hard white (baart) at 66 1/2c per bushel, all basis No. 1 grade in bulk. Nine hundred and twenty cars were received at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals during the week. Flour indemnity payments for export on December 22, were 90c to the Philippines, 95c general and \$1.05 per barrel to China. Demand for cash wheat at Portland was fair during the week, which with lack of selling pressure from growers, made for firm situation in the cash wheat market at Portland. Pacific Northwestern barley markets were steady with prices practically unchanged from a week ago. No. 2 bright western barley weighing 45 pounds was quoted at Portland Dec. 22 at \$1.15 per 100, sacked. Demand for feeding barley in the Willamette Valley continued to feature the general situation in this area.

Oats markets in the Pacific Northwest remained firm. Prices at Portland December 22, were unchanged from the previous week, with No. 2 white oats weighing 38 pounds quoted at \$1.37 1/2 per 100, sacked, with No. 2 gray oats nominal. Receipts of 21 cars of oats at Portland reflected the good trading and movement.

Agricultural Conservation Sheets

The closing date for receiving 1939 Agricultural Conservation worksheets has been extended to January 15, 1939.

The Latah County AAA committee urges all farmers in Latah county who have not filed a worksheet in 1936, 1937 or 1938 to do so before January 15, 1939.

It is important that these worksheets be on file in the county office in order for individuals to comply and receive benefits from the Agricultural Conservation program.

Worksheets may be filed with any community committeeman or at the County Agent's office. Worksheets should not be confused with plan sheets. Worksheets are forms used to file with the committee a record of total acreage, crop acreage, wheat yields, percentage of summer fallow, etc. Plan sheets are forms used to estimate compliance requirements and approximate payments. These Plan sheets will be worked out at a later date in community meetings.

"Free Mail" Costs Huge Sum

The following, from Washington, D. C., tells the reason why the Gazette, and all other newspaper offices, have such large wastebaskets handy to their desks:

"Postmaster General Farley reported to President Roosevelt the postoffice spent \$43,811,556 more than its income in the 1938 fiscal year, but said it would have made \$4,412,821 profit if it had not had the expense of its free service.

"He estimated it cost \$48,224,377 to carry mail free for congressmen, government departments and blind persons, to subsidize air mail and perform "nonpostal" functions."

Milwaukee Pays Taxes

The Milwaukee railroad will this year pay into the treasuries of six Idaho counties the sum of nearly \$120,000 to cover their 1938 taxes, and while Latah county has but a few miles of Milwaukee road within its borders, comparatively speaking, yet the road will pay into Latah county's treasury the sum of \$3,696.23, of a total of \$119,703.23 for the state, to be used to maintain the schools, the highways and local governments for the benefit of residents of the communities.
