BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN 12TH RESERVE DISTRICT

Retail trade, which has lagged somewhat in the recovery of Twelfth Federal Reserve Bank District business during recent months, advanced considerably in October and November. The movement of freight by rail, particularly of merchandise, likewise increased sharply in November on a seasonally adjusted basis, after having shown only a slight expansion during the summer and early fall. New residential building initiated during the month was maintained at about the relatively high levels prevailing since June and preliminary data for December indicate a smaller decline than is usual in the early winter. Although production in the important lumber industry declined slightly, industrial activity in the district generally advanced further in November. Factory employment and payrolls also increased, after allowance for seasonal declines. On the other hand, farm income continued to show the influence of low prices for many products.

Despite the moderate expansion in most lines of activity in the district since the early summer, sales of department stores showed no tendency to increase until October. In fact, a decline from the unusually stable levels of the preceding seven months took place in September. That decline was principally attributable to the strike of department store employees in San Francisco, but after making full allowance for this factor a considerable reduction in the value of sales was evident. In October, a substantial increase took place, gains being reported from almost all parts of the district. These gains continued during November and, with termination of the strike in San Francisco early in the month, seasonally adjusted sales of district department stores were larger than in any other month this year and slightly greater in value than in November, 1937. The weekly reports indicate that about the customary expansion in sales took place in December.

Value of both furniture and apparel store trade has followed a somewhat similar pattern in recent months. Little net change was evident in sales of these stores during the summer and early fall, but expansion of considerably greater than seasonal proportions has taken place in October and November. Registration of new passenger automobiles, which had increased more than seasonally in the preceding two months, advanced further in November to levels approximately as high as in the corresponding month last year. Sales of new commercial cars, however, were 27 per cent lower in November than a year earlier.

During November and the first half of December, excess reserves of district member banks were larger than at any previous time except for a brief period immediately prior to the original increase in reserve requirements effective August 15, 1936. In the week ending December 21, however, excess reserves were sharply reduced. This reduction reflected unusually large United States Treasury collections resulting from cash payments by district purchasers of Treasury bonds and notes dated December 15.

WHEAT MARKET DUE LIGHT OFFERINGS; POOR PROSPECT

Pacific Northwest wheat markets were firmer along with futures. Cash wheat prices advanced from 1/2c to 1 1/4c per bushel at Portland compared with a week ago. On December 29, soft white wheat was quoted at Portland at 68c, western white at 67 1/2c, western red at 65 1/2c, hard white (baart) at 68c and hard red winter at 63 1/2c per bushel, all basis No. 1 grade in bulk. Wheat receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals were fairly heavy and totaled 982 cars for the week. Mill demand for cash wheat remained only moderate during the period. Trade reports indicated sales of a few hundred tons of hard winter wheat was made during the past week. Flour indemnity payments at the close of the week were 90c to the Philippines, 95c general from the Pacific Coast and \$1.05 per barrel to China. Holiday dullness prevailed in the cash wheat market at Portland at the close of the period.

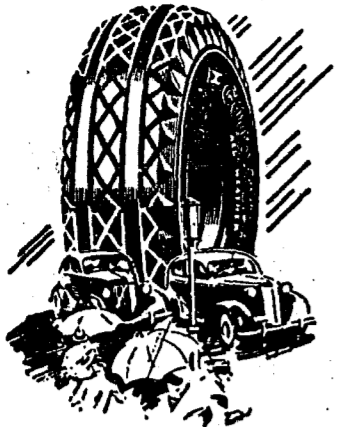

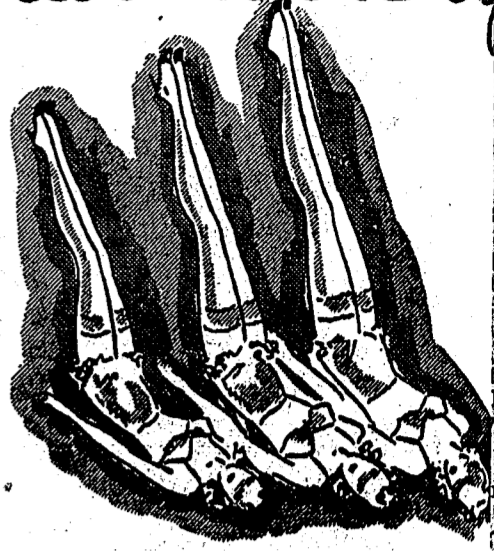

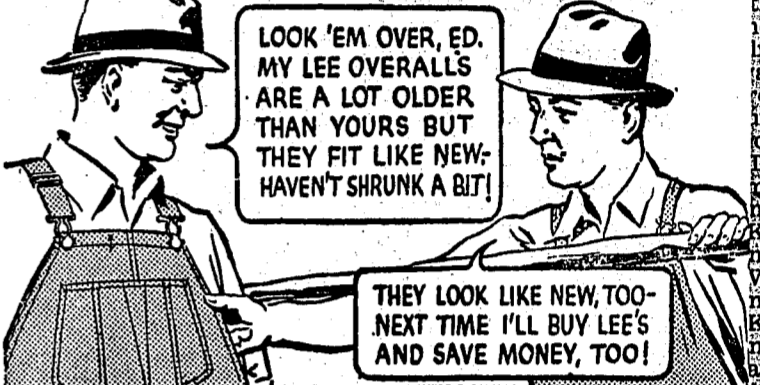
