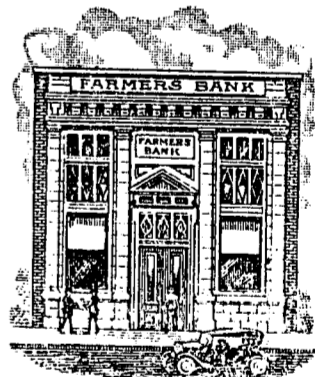

ORDINANCE NO. 237

TITLED, an Ordinance to prohibit the erection, building, maintaining, or operating for private gain, of any further DANCE HALL, PAVILLION, ROLLER SKATING RINK, BOWLING ALLEY, SHOW HOUSE, THEATRE, TAVERN, ROAD HOUSE, BEER PARLOR, BEER GARDEN, SERVICE STATION, SERVICE GARAGE, or any similar business or enterprise, within the corporate limits of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, outside of the fire limits of said Village of Kendrick, and proximating or being near to any residence section within said Village.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO:

SECTION NO. 1. That the erecting, building, operating or maintaining for private gain, of any further DANCE HALL, PAVILLION, ROLLER SKATING RINK, BOWLING ALLEY, TAVERN, ROAD HOUSE, BEER PARLOR, BEER GARDEN, SERVICE STATION, SERVICE GARAGE, or any similar business or enterprise, within the corporate limits of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, outside the fire limits of said Village, and proximating or near to any residence section of said Village, be prohibited and by this ordinance is hereby prohibited.

SECTION NO. 2. That any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof in a court of competent jurisdiction, shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00), and not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) together with the costs of prosecuting for each offense, and in default of payment of such fine shall be imprisoned in the Village jail one day for each One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) of such fine and costs, and may be placed to work on the streets of the said Village of Kendrick, Idaho, for the uses of said Village during the term of such incarceration and imprisonment.

SECTION NO. 3. That the continuing or maintaining of such violation shall be deemed a new offense for each day on which the same is continued and maintained, and each offense shall be punishable accordingly. SECTION 4. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and first publication.
