



Notice is hereby given that there will be held in the City Hall of the Village of Juliaetta, Latah County, Idaho, on the 25th day of April, 1939, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a. m. and 7:00 o'clock p. m. of said day, a municipal election, in accordance with Chapter 164. Title 32, of the Idaho Compiled Statutes A. D. 1919, and all acts amendatory thereto, for the purpose of electing two Village Trustees to serve for a term of four years.
That all qualified electors of the

That the place of registration shall be at the office of the Village Clerk (Heacox Confectionery). You may register up to and including the Saturday just preceeding the date of election.


