## WHAT HAPPENED HERE 20 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

The Frank Frederickson family, living on Main street last morning, had a narrow escape when their team became entangled in a bicycle. The team, headed by a considerable dismounting of the back, threw Mrs. Frederickson and her baby onto the sidewalk. The baby, making many turns, was headed up the Bear road. Mrs. Frederickson received several painful bruises and her baby was stunned for a time; the family came out of the accident with no serious injuries.

The death of Priddy Sneve, which occurred at a hospital 49 at Coburg, Germany. He was the third bridge boy to give his life for his country. After the signing of the armistice, he was sent into Germany with the army of occupation where he was taken ill.

The county commissioners met on Tuesday for the opening of bids for the contract of grading the Powell bridge. Only one bid was received, for \$9,000. As that was approximately double the estimated cost, no contract was awarded. (And still needs fixin'.)

Wm. Freytag was quite seriously injured when struck by a railroad car near the Sturdevant bridge. The car struck him in the back, throwing him flat on his back. He suffered several deep lacerations on his head and various other injuries. For a time there was little hope held out for his recovery, but he is now improving.

The War Debt—Our national debt is about 20 billion dollars and additional loans to allies about 10 billions. Although the U. S. of America after four years of Civil War was \$2,675,000,000 less than half our five billion dollars, the wages, profit and health of the country have grown enormously since then that the present indebtedness of the country is more than the two billions of 1865. The national debt is now nearing a 40-billion-dollar mark.

Mrs. F. E. Harrison of Big Bear ridge has sold her farm of 60 acres to Ole Lien. The land joins Mr. Lien's farm and makes a valuable addition to his holdings. He paid \$100,000 for the 60 acres, or a little over \$1333 per acre. Bear ridge farm is almost off the market as there is practically no land for sale that ridge. Mrs. Harrison purchased 80 acres of land on Texas ridge for which she paid \$75 per acre. This land was purchased from George Drury.

The Kendrick Roller Mills this week made a sale of 6,000 barrels of flour to be ground according to government regulations. The flour to be delivered to the government is monthly.

A male quartet is in the process of formation in Kendrick. Several practice meetings have already been held. The personnel is as follows: Lester Crocker, second bass; Fred Lorenz, first bass; Harold Thomas, second tenor, and Donald Douglas, first tenor.

G. F. Walker of Peck, brother of E. Walker, has purchased the insurance and real estate business of L. G. Peterson. He has been doing considerable real estate business in and around Peck. Mr. Walker is married and expects his wife here soon.

The Kendrick Warehouse and Milling Co. this week received a bear in a warehouse which they are installing in a new warehouse. It is run by an electric motor and requires four men to operate. It is similar to the individual hand-picking machines used for the endless belt upon which the beans are carried from the hopper to the sack. As the belt moves the beans are picked out by both hands and deposited in boxes, one on each side of the belt.

**A. A. A. Meeting**  
On Saturday, April 8, Vocational agricultural instructors of northern Idaho will meet at Kendrick for the purpose of clarifying certain questions of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. A. A. A. officials from Moscow will also be present. These men will set up programs for some of the farms and will show that limitations will be made, the amount of payments for cooperating and the deductions for failing to meet the requirements as set up in the A. A. A. program.

## LOWELL MASON, LEWISTON, NAMED KENDRICK SUPT.

Lowell Mason, Lewiston senior high school track coach and instructor in mathematics and social sciences, has been elected superintendent of schools at Kendrick to succeed J. M. Lyle, Jr., who has resigned to take a similar position at Grangeville. Members of the Kendrick school board confirmed Mason's election and the Bengal track mentor said that he has accepted.

Mr. Mason, a graduate of the University of Idaho in 1930, will complete his eighth year on the Lewiston faculty this spring. He has taken post-graduate work at Idaho and spent two summer sessions at the University of Washington and one at U. S. C., receiving his master's degree from Idaho last spring.

During the last four years here he has served as track coach. His teams in that time have won three north Idaho and three district championships, placed second twice in state meets and last year won first in the "north Idaho state" meet when two state meets were held simultaneously at Boise and Moscow. Mason has also served as assistant football and basketball coach.

At Idaho he has an outstanding hurdler three years on Vandal track teams and also threw the javelin and ran in relay events.—Lewiston Tribune.

Mr. Mason comes to Kendrick with high recommendations and with a record in the Lewiston schools that pretend splendid work in the Kendrick schools, of which he will be the head. He is a married man and has one child, and the people of Kendrick and surrounding territory will receive Mr. and Mrs. Mason and their little family with much pleasure. Mr. Mason comes with not only an excellent school record, but with a high sense of duty to the community of which he is a part.

### NOTICE OF KENDRICK VILLAGE ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that there will be held in the City Hall of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, on the 25th day of April, 1939, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a. m. and 7:00 o'clock p. m. of said day, a municipal election, in accordance with Chapter 164, Title 32, of the Idaho Compiled Statutes A. D. 1919, and all acts amendatory thereto, for the purpose of electing two Village Trustees to serve for a term of four years.

That all qualified electors of the State of Idaho, who have resided within the corporate limits of the said Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, for a period of three months next preceding such election, if and when properly registered according to law, shall be entitled to vote at such election.

That after an elector has registered for a general city or village election he shall not be required to again register for a general city or village election so long as he or she shall continue to reside at the address, ward or precinct in which he is registered.

That if such elector shall fail or neglect to vote for to successive general biennial city or village elections, the clerk shall strike the name of such elector from the Elector's Register, and such elector, in order to vote at the general city or village election, must again register.

That whenever an elector shall have removed from the city or village in which he is so registered, and shall remain away from such city or village for a period of one year, his name shall be stricken from said register, and if he shall thereafter again reside in such city or village for at least thirty (30) days, he shall again register.

That the place for registration shall be at the office of the Village Clerk (Kendrick State Bank). You may register up to and including the Saturday just preceding the date of election.

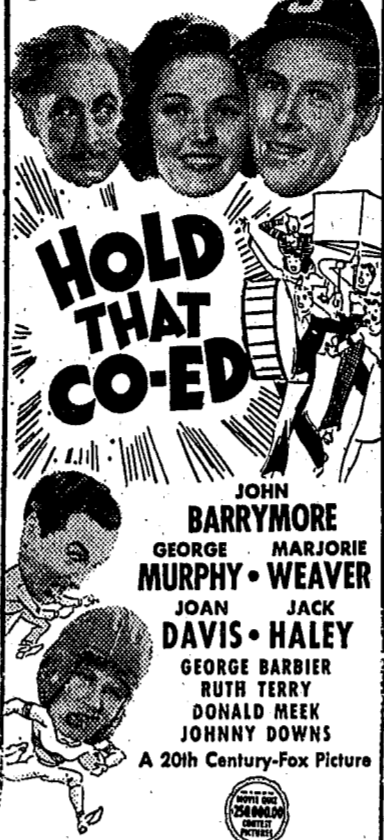
