#### COMPILED FIGURES SHOW IDAHO ACCIDENT TOLL

The humble decimal point of the statician has been described as the stethoscope of the traffic expert in the prevention of motor vehicle accidents.

From the mass of accident reports received by the department of law enforcement at Boise from the drivers involved, from sheriffs, from all law enforcement officers are gathered pages of figures, fractions, ratios and summaries on how, when where and why and to whom motor vehicle accidents occur. From these the traffic engineer slowly evolves a picture that shows the way to safety.

The experience of 20 years has definitely proven the value of accurate and complete reports. Modern prevention work is premised on such reports and nearly every state in the union has recognized this fact by passage of legislation requiring them to be sent to some central agency such as the department of law enforcement at Boise. This department in turn, reports to the National Safety Council that statistics may

be compiled for the whole nation. One of the computations made in the office of Harry M. Rayner, com-missioner of law enforcement at Boise has just been released It is table of the number killed per 100,000 population in each county of Idaho during the last six months.

The counties are shown in three groups, according to population. Group A 10,000 and over; Group B, 5,000 to 10,000, and Group C, under 5,000.


