EDITORIAL

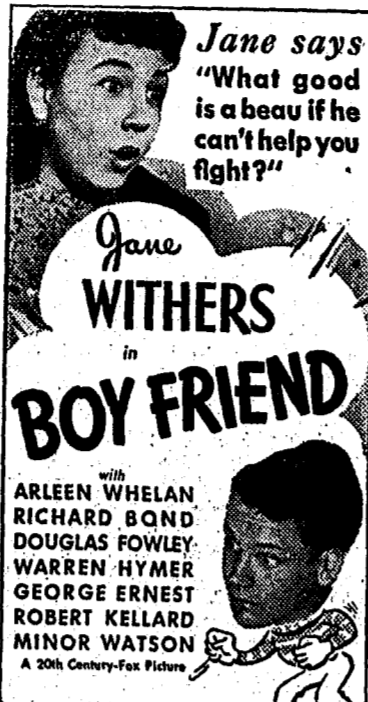
