225 Growers Get Indemnity Checks
Figures which are "practically complete" for Idaho show that 225 wheat growers in the state will receive indemnity checks for losses to wheat crops insured under the federal crop insurance program, Paul Carlson, chairman of the Latah County Agricultural Conservation announced. The announcement was coupled today with the warning that "Monday, October 30, is the last day on which wheat growers in north Idaho can apply for federal crop insurance on fall-sown wheat. In Latah County six farmers will receive insurance checks for wheat crop losses.

Study of the results of the first year of the crop insurance program, a part of the national AAA farm program, has revealed some interesting facts about crop hazards in Idaho. Of the 295 crop losses insured in the state, 60 were on irrigated fields, while 165 struck dryland farmers. However, 310 of the 1,771 policies written in Idaho's 1939 wheat crop were written on irrigated farms, while 1,461 were taken out by dry-farmers. This means 20 per cent of the irrigated farmers were protected by Federal crop insurance and will receive indemnity payments. Over the state, approximately 15 per cent of the insured wheat producers will collect on their policies.

Most frequently stated causes for crop losses were drought and frost. However, damage by hail, jackrabbits, winterkill in areas where re-seeding in spring is not possible, and grasshoppers were paid for out of the insurance reserve maintained by the Federal Crop Insurance corporation.

On a national scale, the 1940 program has been accepted widely by winter wheat farmers. Winter wheat paid-up applications alone equal the total number of policies sold under the entire 1939 program. The sign-up in spring wheat areas of Idaho and the nation will begin soon.

A feature of the 1940 crop insurance program is the fact that farmers may pay their premiums by advances obtained against Agricultural Conservation program payments for which they have qualified.

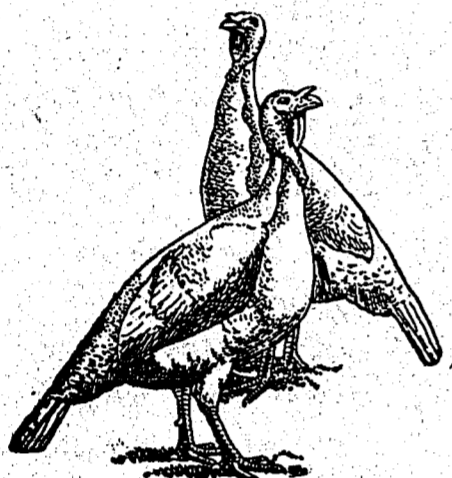
EDITORIAL

SENATOR WM. E. BORAH VOTED "MAN OF THE WEEK"

Senator William E. Borah, Republican of Idaho, has been selected as the first winner of the weekly award to the "Man of the Week" on the national scene, by the Man of the Week Committee of Judges, it was announced today by Fulton Lewis, Jr., nightly radio commentator from Washington over 85 stations of the Mutual Broadcasting system. Congratulating Senator Borah upon his selection of "Man of the Week," Fulton Lewis, Jr. said: "Last Sunday, Mr. John Hamilton, the Republican National chairman, asked republicans in Congress to stand by the party in the next session. The Republican Senator Borah, of Idaho, made immediate reply to that. He said he would vote with the party when he believed it was right, against it, when it believed it was wrong. Our judges believe that was the voice of true statesmanship — whether it was a Republican speaking of his party or a Democrat, speaking of his. So, tonight, we're proud to give the first award, for the "Man of the Week," to Senator Borah of Idaho."

Senator Borah, ranking Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations committee, has served in the Senate longer than any other Senator. He receives, as Man of the Week, the award of a radio set and a plaque inscribed with the tribute of the Committee of Judges. Each Friday, Lewis will announce the selection by the judges of the "Man of the Week" on the national scene—the man, or woman, who has performed outstanding achievement of the week in public affairs or public service.

death and 46,000 received injuries from skidding vehicles throughout the nation. Wet surfaces, wet leaves on the road, snow and ice all contributed to the high number of skidding mishaps.

While the motorist driving on snow or ice is likely to be well prepared with chains and to exercise more than normal care, he often fails to use caution when going over leaves because they do not seem to present as hazardous a condition, the safety men assert. Again, while the average motorist will proceed slowly if the road is coated with snow or ice, he will tend to drive over leaves at the pace he usually follows when the surface is clear.

For that reason accidents caused by skidding on wet leaves may be more serious than other skidding accidents.
