Domestic wheat markets strengthened and feed grains maintained steady tone during the week ending Following a delicious dinner the November 24, the Agricultural Marketing Service reports in the Week-High scores for the evening were ly Grain Market Review. Continued strengthening influences in wheat prices and offset the slow inquiry Oats were firm to slightly higher. with barley little changed from the previous week.

Developments in the southern hemisphere were becoming of increasing importance in the general wheat situation. Despite the better weather in recent weeks further deterioration is reported in the Argentine crop, which, according to private estimates, may total only 200 million bushels this season, compared with nearly 340 million bushels for the 1938-39 season. The Argentine wheat acreage this season is now estimated at 17.833,000 acres. or approximately three million acres less than the final estimate for the 1938-39 crop. Exports from the old crop were fairly large during the week and totaled 4,346;000 bushels. Prospects in Australia remain gent erally steady with most trade reports placing the 1939-40 harvest slightly above the previous years outturn. Growers are reported as agitating for an increase in th guaranteed price but the slowed mand for Australian wheat because of the long shipping distance to European buyers is causing small export-movement of Australian grain At the close of the week Australian wheat was offered FOB ports at 49c and Argentine Rosafe at 5014c per bushel. This compared with 61th for No. 2 Canadian Manitoba from Vancouver and 77½c for No. 1

Little information is available as to European markets because of war restrictions. - Clear weather favored field work in the Balkan states but seeding was backward in some sections. Planting was progressing ver Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Newman and actively in Germany but in most of western Europe the ground remained too wet for seeding, which progressed slowly with indications that much land will be left for spring cereals. In Belgium the quantity of native wheat in milling mixtures was raised to 25 per cent, effective Nov. 27. Arrivals of foreign wheat were reported more nearly normal following recent light arrivals resulting in delays caused by war measures. Wheat futures in domestic markets advanced to the highest point of the season for December delivery Mrs. A.
