**WHEAT MARKET FIRMER: POOR CROPS INFLUENCE**

Cash wheat prices in the Pacific Northwest declined 1/4c per bushel on the principal classes during the past week despite slight gains at midwestern markets. Continued slow demand from millers, exporters and elevator interests was the principal weakening factor in the these markets. On Nov. 24 cash wheat prices at Portland were shown at 78 1/2c for soft and western white; 78c for western red; 78c for hard red winter and 83 1/2c per bushel for hard white (baart), all basis No. 1 grade in bulk.

Wheat receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals dropped to only 339 cars for the past week, reflecting the very light trading and movement in cash wheat at these markets. No export sales were reported made from Pacific Northwest ports during the period. Mills and exporters were not actively in the market for wheat, but growers were reported offering only small amounts at country points. Taken altogether, the cash wheat market situation was extremely quiet at Pacific Northwest terminals during the past week. Wheat millfeels held steady to firm with prices about unchanged.

Generally steady prices prevailed at Kansas City with arrivals for the week totaling 335 cars. Nine principal winter wheat markets in the mid-west received 1,093 cars compared with 1187 cars the previous week and 1679 cars a year ago. Cash demand was fair to good most of the week.

Receipts of all classes of wheat at Minneapolis during the week were 733 cars while Duluth unloaded 589 cars. Even though domestic flour demand was slow and mill demand only fair, cash prices tended firm because of the extremely limited offerings.

**Marines Accepting Enlistment**

A few vacancies will be open in the U. S. Marine corps soon for qualified young men between the ages of 18 and 28, who can pass the required physical examination and who have excellent character standing in their community.

All men accepted for enlistment will be transferred to the Recruit Depot, Marine Corps Base, San Diego, Calif., for six to eight weeks of military training. Upon completion of this training they will, in all probability, be transferred to one of the many foreign shore stations such as Hawaii, Guam, the Philippine Islands, or China, where the marines are now serving, or to the marine detachment aboard one of the battleships, heavy cruisers or aircraft carriers of the United States fleet.

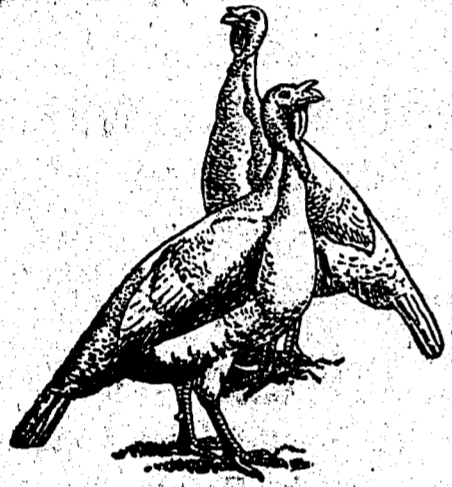

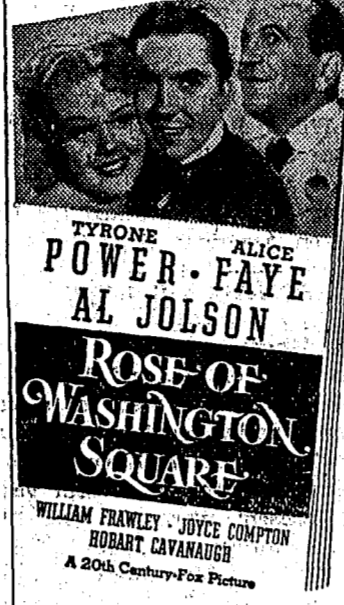
