## WHAT HAPPENED HERE 20 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

This week G. M. Lewis sold his garage and repair shop to Herman Schupfer and Eddie Deobald, who will take possession at once. They will be equipped to handle anything in the line of car repairing. The new firm has not definitely decided about handling cars, but will probably take on some line.

The following items are taken from "Fifteen Years Ago" — (December, 1904): Holbrook and Son of Juliaetta are preparing to put an electric light system into that place and would probably consider a proposition to carry the same to Kendrick. The minimum expense entailed in the operation makes the project feasible and we believe the proposition is worthy of our consideration. . . . Frank Byrne has bought the Stoddard farm on Potlatch ridge, just above town, near the tramway. There are 160 acres in it, of which about 100 are tillable, the rest being pasture and timber land. He now has upwards of 500 acres in one body. He is having about 1,000 cords of wood cut on the benches above town.

Latah County Press (Deary)—Old timers say we are having the longest cold spell we have had for many years. Thermometers have registered all the way from zero down for a week and part of the time wind and snow have added to the discomforts. Potlatch has 14 inches and there is deep snow in the Palouse country. Lewiston is reported under 14 inches or more of snow, with bitter weather; wood selling as high as \$16 a cord. We now have snow and this morning thermometers showed 24 degrees below. Whew!

Leland News—Saturday morning December 13, was the extreme low temperature for the Potlatch ridge for many a year, the thermometer registering 30 degrees below zero! Last Thursday night, December 12, was the coldest night on record in Kendrick, thermometers registering 25 below zero—the lowest temperature ever known here. It was 28 degrees below at Troy and 23 degrees below at Lewiston.

Spuds are some "taters" these days. The wholesale quotation the first of the week was \$3.50 per 100—and not very plentiful at that.

The ice houses of Kendrick are filled to overflowing, the last of the ice having been put up Monday. It was 15 inches thick and of a very good quality.
