KENDRICK GAZETTE ENDS 49TH PUBLICATION YEAR

With this issue of the paper, the Kendrick Gazette begins its 50th year of publication — not always under the name of the Kendrick Gazette, not always under the same owners, many having preceded us on the job, but nevertheless, this newspaper has been published for 49 years — we are beginning with this publication the 50th year of the paper and the 11th under this management.

As we look back on the files of the papers that are left to us, many of them having been destroyed by the two big fires, and some apparently lost — we find a graphic history of the progress of Kendrick and of this paper.

As nearly as we have been able to ascertain, to Eugene Elliott of Bear Ridge goes the honor of being the oldest subscriber, he having been a continuous reader since its first publication, 49 years ago.

This place was previously shared with him by "Scotty" Wilson, but when Mr. Wilson began making his home with daughters and sons some months ago, and they being subscribers, his paper was dropped, and so, it seems that Mr. Elliott is our oldest reader — and that represents a lot of time.

In the columns of the Gazette no attempt has been made to bring to you world news, rather, a sincere attempt to bring you the news of the Potlatch section — for it is our belief that the local news is the purpose of a small town newspaper, and World news that of the really large daily papers.

How well we have succeeded, in our attempts to publish the kind of paper our readers want, and one of which our advertisers can approve, we cannot say, but in the face of a fine and steady subscription list, despite the drop in farm population, we are rather inclined to believe we have. We have a fine and loyal list of country correspondents, careful and accurate, and we sincerely appreciate the help they have given us in making the Kendrick Gazette the paper it is today.

In the mechanical department of our institution, we have added a number of fine and modern pieces in our ten years of ownership. We feel that we can safely claim one of the best equipped country shops in the entire northwest. Included in this equipment is an automatic press unit, enabling us to produce fine printing at high speed and with a minimum of expense.

The Kendrick business men have supported us loyally, and we can but say "Thank You All," at the beginning of this year.

We realize, of course, that we are not receiving all of the work originating in Kendrick, but on the other hand we have received work from outside sources to counterbalance our loss.

Postoffice Reports

The stamp sales at the Kendrick Post Office show a decrease of 3 per cent for the year of 1939, or total sales of \$3,584.03 compared with \$3,690.16 for 1938.

The sale of bonds increased in 1939, total for the year being \$24,450.00 compared with \$16,125.00 for 1938. Postal savings also showed a gain over 1938.

DEATH TAKES OLD-TIME AMERICAN RIDGE RESIDENT

Mrs. Walter Q. Taylor, 56, wife of county assessor Taylor, died late Sunday afternoon at the family home at 327 North Van Buren street, death following an illness of several weeks with a heart ailment.

Mrs. Taylor, whose maiden name was Norma Carlton, was born in April of 1883 at Colorado Springs, Colo., as her parents were crossing the continent in an immigrant train of wagons. They came directly to Idaho, where her father homesteaded near Kendrick on American ridge, and where she resided for many years, even after her marriage to Mr. Taylor.

She was a graduate of the Lewiston Normal school, and taught school for many years in Latah county. She was married to Mr. Taylor in 1902.

Mrs. Taylor was prominent in church and social circles. She was president of the Moscow historical society during 1937 and 1938, and was an active member of the Methodist church and a teacher in the Sunday school. She was a member of Star Rebekah lodge and was for many years an Eastern Star. She had published several books of poems.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2 p. m. from the Short funeral chapel, with the Rev. Owen J. Beades, pastor of the Methodist church in charge.

Leona Carlson Passes
