Some agreed with the article, some took issue, some said they "didn't know."

Frankly, we didn't know, nor do we know yet — and many others admit they don't know as yet. But regardless of that, all say the beans were damaged. The amount of the damage depending greatly, it seems, on the degree of dryness of the hulls when the rain hit, as well as their location (north slope, south slope, etc.).

Be that as it may, if the weather will continue dry and warm, with perhaps a breeze, many beans will be saved, with a possible upping of quality over that thought possible last week.

Farmer's have been very busy the forepart of this week turning the bean piles, some using bull rakes, as well as the pitchfork method. How well a combine will work on these beans is a matter of conjecture.
