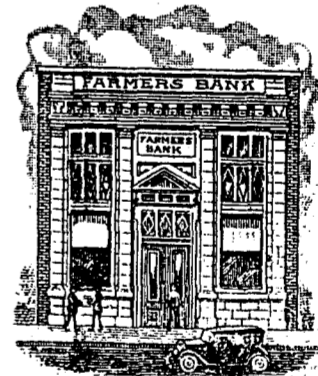

ORDINANCE NO. 243

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THAT PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY REQUIRE THE DISCONTINUANCE AND VACATION OF ALL THAT PORTION OF 3rd STREET, LYING SOUTHERLY FROM THE NORTH BOUNDARY LINES OF LOT 9, BLOCK 7, AND LOT 7, BLOCK 6, EXTENDED ACROSS 3rd STREET, AND ALL THAT PORTION OF RAILROAD STREET, LYING EASTERLY OF THE EAST BOUNDARY LINE OF LOT 10, BLOCK 7, EXTENDED ACROSS RAILROAD STREET TO THE NORTHERLY LINE OF THE RAILROAD RIGHT-OF-WAY, ALL IN THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO, ACCORDING TO THE RECORDED PLAT THEREOF; VACATING AND ABANDONING SAID PORTIONS OF SAID STREETS AND AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING CONVEYANCES OF SAID VACATED PORTIONS OF SAID STREETS TO THE OWNERS OF THE ADJACENT REAL ESTATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CHAIRMAN AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, IDAHO:

Section 1. That it is hereby determined and decided that public convenience and necessity require the vacation and abandonment of all that portion of 3rd Street, lying Southerly from the North Boundary Lines of Lot 9, Block 7, and Lot 7, Block 6, extended across 3rd Street, and all that portion of Railroad Street, lying easterly of the East Boundary Line of Lot 10, Block 7, extended across Railroad Street to the Northerly Line of the Railroad right-of-way, all in the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho.

Section 2. That all the above described portions of 3rd Street and Railroad Street in the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, be, and the same is hereby vacated and abandoned as a public way, and its use as a public way shall immediately, upon this ordinance becoming effective, cease and determine forever.

Section 3. That it is hereby determined and decided that Lewiston Grain Growers, Inc., a corporation, owns Lots 7 and 8, Block 6, of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho; that Herman Schupfer owns Lots 9 and 10 of Block 7, of the Village of Kendrick, and that the Northern Pacific Railway Company has disclaimed any right, title or interest it may have in and to the portion of 3rd Street or Railroad Street vacated as herein mentioned, as appears by its title memorandum No. 365.

Section 4. That it is hereby determined and decided that the property

er officials of the Village of Kendrick, be, and they are hereby authorized and directed to make execute and deliver to Lewiston Grain Growers, Inc., and to Herman Schupfer, as adjacent owners, good and sufficient transfers and conveyances of the portions of streets hereby vacated and abandoned as their interests may appear.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval and after publication in one issue of the Kendrick Gazette.

"Well-er, you are thoughtful enough, I suppose. But would you mind telling me how you happened to discover there was a hole in my pocket?"

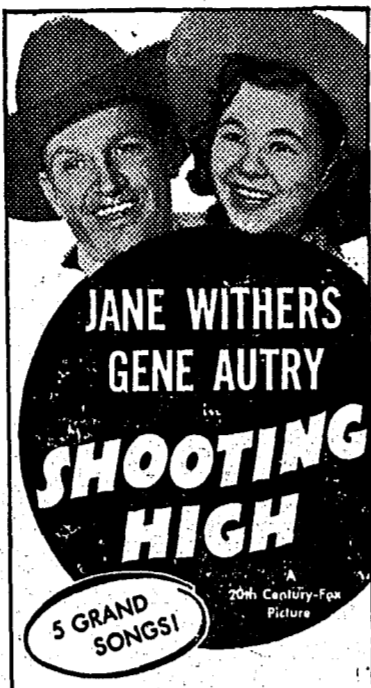
