WHEAT FUTURES MARKET IN N. W. SLIGHTLY HIGHER

The North American crop was placed at 1,366,700,000 bushels or 107,000,000 bushels over that of the previous season with good yields in Canada principally responsible for the increase. The 1940 European crop, not including Russia, is about 340,000,000 bushels short of the 1939 harvest and is roughly estimated at 1,375,000,000 with official data from many countries lacking. Southern Hemisphere crops are still uncertain but South American production is placed at 77 million bushels, of which 220 million bushels are in Argentina.

The Australian harvest is now placed at 100 million bushels. On the basis of these estimates, world production will total 6,100,000,000 bushels this season against 6,200,000,000 bushels in 1939-40 and 6,600,000,000 bushels in 1938-39.
