#### AAA DEADLINES FALL IN MONTH OF DECEMBER

Latah county farmers were reminded of two important AAA farm program deadlines this week by H. F. Koster, chairman of the county Agricultural Conservation Committee. December 31 is the last day for submitting applications for parity payments on the 1940 wheat crop and for applying for commodity loans on wheat and barley.

All wheat producers who signed up last spring to participate in the program and did not overplant 1940 wheat acreage allotments on any farms in which they are interested, are eligible for 1940 parity payments. Most eligible farmers in the county already have received their 1940 parity payments, made at the rate of 10c per bushel on the yield established for the farm.

However, a few eligible farmers have not come in to sign their applications, and they will lose out, unless they sign them by December 31.

Loans from the Commodity Credit Corporation on 1940 wheat and barley stored either in approved warehouses or farm granaries will be available to Latah county farmers until December 31; also, the committee announced. Loan rates in Latah county average 55c a bushel, varying according to the loading point; while barley loans are based on 35c a bushel for No. 1 barley in farm storage and 28c for the same grade stored in warehouses.

Wheat loans are still being made at the rate of more than a million bushels a day over the nation, and 260 million bushels are now said to be under loan.

#### Frank Wilken Heard From

In a letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Milton Wilken, Frank Wilken, who left some two weeks ago to spend the winter with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Diehl, in Missouri, he states: "I met Diehl's in Denver Sunday evening Monday were drove to Colorado Springs and 18 miles up Pike's Peak, to an elevation of about 12,000 feet. We came to a U. S. F. station and the gates were locked. We had 2,000 feet to go, two miles by car. We started walking but soon found out why the gates were closed. It had been warm at the bottom, but when we got up here we found 3 inches of snow and it was very cold.

Tuesday we started for Santa Fe, N. M., but snow and ice made it hard to go over 10 or 15 miles an hour. We saw the oldest well in the U. S. A.—no one knows how long the Indians used it before the white men came. We stayed at Los Yegras, N. M. that night and got to Santa Fe the next day. It was a typical Mexican town. Mud or adobe houses with flat roofs and very narrow streets. Wednesday night we stayed in Albuquerque, N. M. A pretty town with an old mission and lots of Mexicans and Indians.

"We crossed the muddy Rio Grande river three times. It is dry and sandy now, but in the spring it runs bank full.

"Thanksgiving Day we went through Santa Rosa and that night got to Amarillo, Texas. Amarillo is the location of one of the largest helium gas plants in the world. We went to see it but were not permitted to get very close because of the danger of sabotage. It is a pretty town of about 30,000, and this country is so level we could see nine towns from one spot. They say one can see 59 miles in any direction. It was very warm while we were there, but the next day the wires were covered with five inches of ice and snow. Telephone and light poles snapped like matches. We were lucky to miss that storm.

"We ran into a lot of fog Friday but got into Oklahoma City about 9:00 p. m. We saw plenty of oil wells and visited the Will Rogers Memorial at Claremore the next day. We drove through about 50 miles of mining country and on into Missouri.

"We arrived in Springfield about 9:30. It has been somewhat foggy and cold here and the wind is blowing.

"I haven't told you of many of the interesting things about the trip, but will tell you more when I see you."

#### DEFERMENT IS INDIVIDUAL — NOT FOR A TRADE

To avoid any possibility of men with no experience flocking to so-called "defense industries" to escape compliance with the requirements of the Selective Service Act, it must be made clear that the Act prohibits the deferment of men in groups or industries, state headquarters for Selective Service, declare.

Captain Percy A. Laselle, state occupational advisor, selective service, said: "In the World War the basis for the deferment of men from training included certain exemptions for entire industries. One of these industries was shipbuilding and the blanket exemption for that trade almost provoked a national scandal because men with no experience as shipbuilders attempted to enter the industry to avoid military service.

"The present Selective Service Act was written with a provision definitely designed to preclude the repetition of such difficulties."

Referring to the responsibility of the local board in determining the status of all registrants, Capt. Laselle said: "It has full authority to defer the military training of any registrant. Furthermore, the board can defer him on the grounds of his necessity to industry whether that industry in which he is engaged is one of a 'defense' character or not."

Captain Laselle also pointed out that as an additional protection for industry and business, local boards had been given authority to defer the military training of men if they believed the registrants were "essential" in their jobs even though the individuals did not request deferment themselves.

#### Will Pay Big Tax Bill

The Washington Water Power company will pay \$10,461.74 in taxes on its electrical properties to Latah county Monday, according to an announcement received this week, by C. R. Hunter, Moscow, district manager for the electric service company.

A check for the above amount, the first installment for the year 1940 on the company's properties in Latah county, will be presented to county officials by Mr. Hunter. The final installment will be paid in June, 1941.

Eight other Idaho counties—Benewah, Bonner, Clearwater, Idaho, Kootenai, Lewis, Nez Perce and Shoshone—also will receive tax payment checks Monday, according to W. H. Ude, of Spokane, manager of the company's claim, tax and right of way department. Total amount of property taxes which the W. W. P. Co. will pay to the nine Idaho counties Monday is \$125,028.59.

The Washington Water Power company's tax total to the nine counties for the entire year of 1940 is \$254,873.53, according to statistics released by the claim, tax and right of way department.

Rev. Gray of Kendrick was the Dean of the Institute.

## EDITORIAL

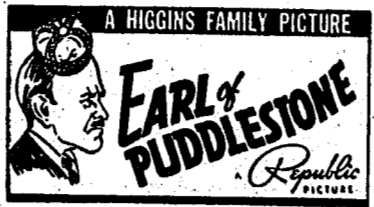
