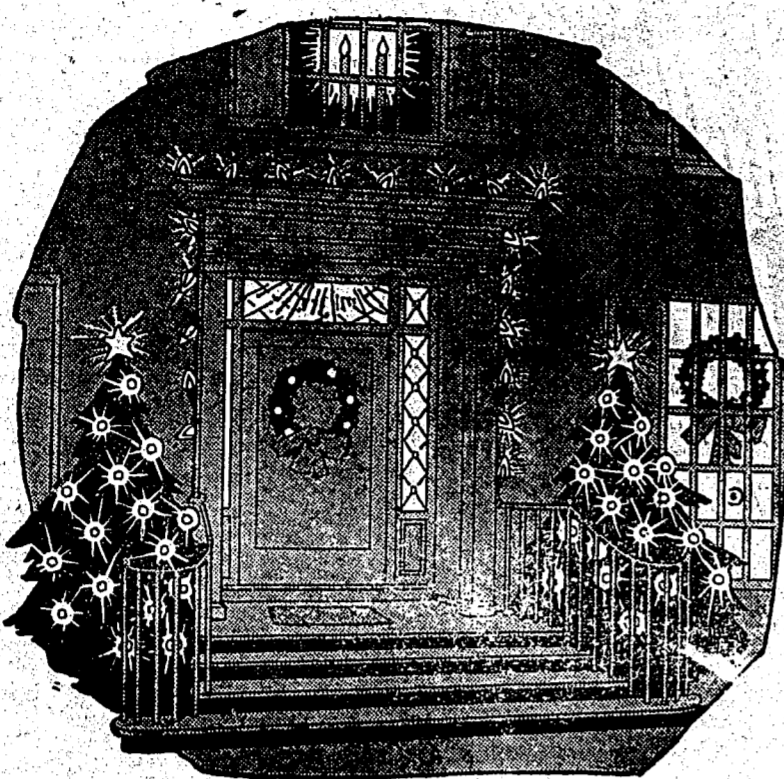
Every effort is being made to keep the roads clear of them, but they have been coming down so fast that it has proven an almost impossible task.



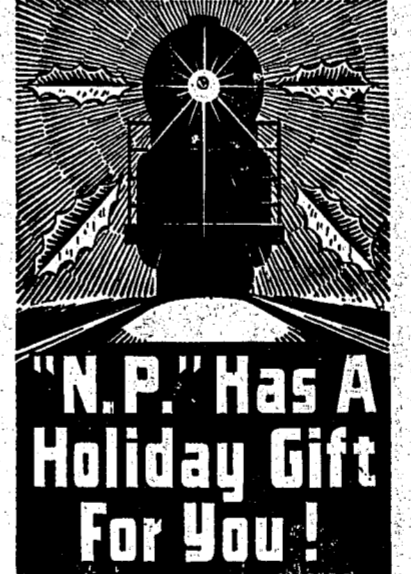
