## Axis Air Bases Near U. S.

Sir Howard D'Egville, secretary of the Empire Parliamentary association, told the Toronto legislature today that 20 secret air bases in Mexico are operating for the benefit of the axis powers.  
His statement was described as a reply to assertions of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh that North America is safe from invasion by air.  
Lieut.-Col. George Drew, conservative leader in the legislature, said relations between Canada and the United States could be improved if Canadians "do not hesitate to condemn such men as Henry Ford and Col. Lindbergh—quills to the system under which they live."

Grangeville, Feb. 25. The board of the Grangeville independent school district No. 2 met Monday night at the schoolhouse and accepted the resignation of Supt. James M. Lyle, Jr. Mr. Lyle has accepted a position as assistant state superintendent of public instruction under C. W. Roberts.

Mr. Lyle graduated from the University of Idaho in 1929 and has a master's degree. He taught one year in a rural school, three years at Southwick, acting as superintendent one-half year, and he was superintendent six years at Kendrick before coming here in the summer of 1939.

Mr. Lyle is the son of Dr. and Mrs. James M. Lyle of Lewiston. Mr. and Mrs. Lyle will leave Grangeville before March 10, or as soon as the school board chooses his successor. At the next regular meeting of the board, teachers for the year will be elected.

## To "Balance" Budget

Tydings said the committee, which will have \$10,000 for the study, would begin its studies promptly.

## KENDRICK DRAWS SUB-DISTRICT B. B. TOURNAMENT

Some time ago, by agreement between the coaches and district officials, the matter of whether Kendrick or Culesac were to be the hosts for this year's sub-district basketball tournament, was left on a play-off basis, and Friday night of last week too many teams were in the scramble with an almost identical percentage, to permit the definite awarding of the tournament. On Saturday afternoon Genesee and Culesac played it off to see who would form the fourth entry team—Kendrick and Lapwai having been sure placers by their wins of Friday evening.

On Monday night of this week the tournament play began, with Kendrick and Juliaetta sweeping through the first round before a really capacity audience, to enter the semi-finals here Wednesday evening. It is possible that the winner here Wednesday may be crowned with the championship and clinch the No. 1 position as representative of the league at the district tournament at Lewiston March 5, 6, 7 and 8.

Kendrick won the opening contest 32-20 from Lapwai, taking an early lead, while setting up an iron-clad defense, which held Lapwai to but five points and the first half ended 17 for Kendrick, Watts, Kendrick, led the scoring with 12 and Webb was high for Lapwai with seven.

Genesee, in fourth place in the regular season came back to hand Juliaetta a 27 to 12 defeat. The winners were ahead 17 to eight at the intermission. Abern paced the winners with 12. Weber and Burns were high for Juliaetta with four each.

Wednesday Evening Games  
The second evening of tournament play, Wednesday evening of this week, saw the big gymnasium filled to the limit with cheering, boating and rooting fans from all over this section of the country.

The first game of the evening, that of Lapwai vs. Juliaetta, or loser vs. loser of Monday evening's play, wound up with a final score of 46-32 in favor of Lapwai. During the course of the play Lapwai committed 14 fouls and Juliaetta 16, with neither team converting very well from the "stripe."

It was a real basketball battle from start to finish, and the losers need not feel hurt, for the fight was a good one.

The second game of the evening, Kendrick vs. Genesee, or winner vs. winner of Monday evening's play, was thrill-packed from start to finish. Genesee jumped into an early lead, the first quarter ending 11-2 in favor of that team; the second quarter ended 17-9, Genesee; and the third quarter 21-17, Genesee; and then Kendrick really turned on the heat, with a display of ball-handling, shooting and backboard retrieving that would do credit to many a school of larger size—and when the fire-works were over the score stood 37 to 24 in favor of Kendrick.

Kendrick committed nine fouls during the game, and Genesee 10 fouls, neither team converting from the stripe for even a fair percentage.

Friday Evening Games  
The games tomorrow evening, Friday, will see the losers of game No. 4 (Genesee) pitted against the winners of game No. 3 (Lapwai) as the main attraction, with the two other teams of this conference Southwick and Culesac, pitted in an exhibition game.

### Over Million Cars Sold

The second greatest sales year in the history of Chevrolet was announced here on January 7 by W. E. Truck sales, likewise, showed substantial gains during the year, the report shows, totalling 197,202, an advance of 11.9 per cent over the 176,090 sold during 1939.

### 10,000 More Be Inducted Mar. 17-31

Ten thousand young men in the ninth corps area will be inducted into the army between March 17 and 31 under the selective service act, army headquarters at San Francisco reported Monday.

Of the 10,000, California will furnish 7,030. Quotas for other states in the ninth corps area are: Washington 1,080, Oregon 300, Montana 480, Utah 410, Idaho 360 and Nevada 110.

About 4,000 of the new men will be sent to the reception center at Fort McArthur, San Pedro. Three thousand will go to the Monterey Presidio, 2,187 to Fort Lewis, Wash., and 783 to Fort Douglas, Salt Lake City.

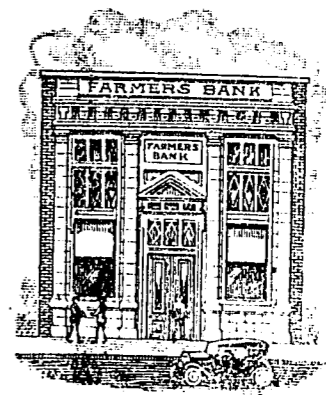

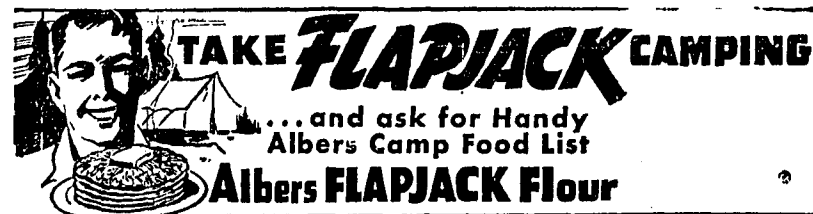
