KENDRICK BOWS TO OROFINO AND ELK RIVER IN PLAY

Kendrick's Tigers drew the Orofino Maniacs in their opening game at the Lewiston basketball tournament last Wednesday evening at 9:20. Below is an account of the game, taken from the Lewiston Tribune of Thursday:

After a slow first half the Orofino Maniacs and the Kendrick Tigers let go in the closing two quarters to present the most maple court dynamite of the tournament so far, as Orofino edged Kendrick 25 to 24 with a swisher by Shriver in the closing seconds of the game.

Playing the cleanest game of the evening, the B class night cap apparently was a cinch victory for Coach Doug Cordon's Maniacs as they left the floor at the half ahead 13 to 8. Coming back in the third period they began sparking and ran the score to 23 to 12 before the Tigers uncorked a free throw to end the period 23 to 13 behind.

In the fourth quarter, the Tigers drew on the fighting spirit of the jungle and poured the ball through the hoop from all angles to creep up and pass Orofino at 24-23, within a minute and a half to go, holding the Maniacs scoreless since before the third period.

As the tempo quickened, the big crowd took up the chant until it was impossible to hear official's whistles or anything but the screams of the fans of both teams imploring the players to shoot. After chasing the ball from one end of the gym to the other three times with no out-of-bounds and looped it in for the victory. With that, even the timer's gun had a hard time being heard as the game ended seconds later.

Of Thursday's game, with Kendrick meeting Elk River in a consolation playoff, the official account reports:

With the lead banded back and forth like a bean bag, Elk River and Kendrick battled through 2½ of the closest quarters of the tournament so far, in the first round of the single elimination consolation playoff before Elk River poured it on to swamp Kendrick 46 to 27 and eliminate Kendrick from the tournament.

Both teams lost first round games, but Elk River came back in the third and fourth quarters to keep the hoop hot from the friction of balls swishing through.

Elk River scored the first basket but Kendrick countered with a rush which netted them 11 points to four for Elk River before the White Pine squad began moving. Kendrick advanced the score 13 to 7 and then bogged down as Elk River held them scoreless to end the half leading 15 to 13.

Kendrick took one more lead at 16 to 15 and tied the score at 16 and again at 18. Elk River jumped to 22-18 and Kendrick came within one point at 22-21 and then the bottom dropped out.

Elk River went on a scoring spree which carried them to 33 before Kendrick could advance beyond 21 and from then on the outcome was clinched. The teams alternated baskets from that point but Elk River showed no sign of slowing up or of loosening its defense.

Coaches of the second district basketball teams met at the Bollinger Hotel Saturday at noon for their annual tournament luncheon and to choose the all-district class B team of ten players and designate honorable mention of seven others. Taking a new tack this year, they did not complete first and second teams but named the ten to the first string squad. The All-District Class B team follows:

Squirrel hunters and target shooters, lured into the great outdoors by ideal weather, are breaking more laws than they are targets.

Conservation Officer Harry Palmer, Moscow, warns that "there will be some arrests made if hunters don't stop firing in game preserves and from public highways."

Palmer said he had received a number of complaints to the effect that a great number of riflemen have been shooting in the Robinson park sanctuary.

"Others seem to think that the law covering shooting from highways applies only to the North and South," Palmer asserted. "However, it is meant to prohibit shooting from any road maintained by public funds."

"If they're going to keep at it, I'm going to have to pinch some of 'em, and that would be bad."

CLUB HOLDS INTERESTING MEET AT SCHOOL HOUSE

The Kendrick Commercial club held their regular monthly meeting in the school building Monday night with only 17 members present. The members of the Kendrick basketball team were entertained by the club at dinner. Each member of the club had a few words to say and Coach Armitage gave a very interesting talk about the team and the good behavior and sportsmanship of the boys, which everyone admires. The boys made a fine showing at the Lewiston tournament after winning the Class B tournament at Kendrick.

Supt. L. W. Masoh made a few very interesting remarks along this line, laying stress on the tournament and the splendid behavior of the boys under all circumstances. He also congratulated the Girls' League, who were responsible for the entertainment and dance given the teams at the close of the Kendrick tournament.

After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting and their approval, reports of committees were called for, the first being, as a matter of course, about highways, and N. E. Walker, chairman of the Highway committee, reported that the Texas ridge road is being graveled and the work is going forward very nicely. Starting on Friday of this week a double shift will be started with the graveled trucks, and even then it is estimated that it will take in the neighborhood of two months to accomplish the task. A 14-foot graveled surface is to be laid.

The next question taken up and discussed was the care of the local cemetery, the discussion leading to talk of a cemetery district, the same plan being used in other sections, to permit perpetual care of the grounds, but no concrete action was taken.

The ever present Boy Scout question was discussed at some length but no action was taken, awaiting the arrival of some of the leaders of the organization from Lewiston, when the situation will be fully discussed and some plan mapped out at the next meeting of the Commercial club.

George Brocke was appointed as chairman of a merchant's special committee to look into entertainment and perhaps a Sales Day of some kind to be put on this spring. Marvin Long of the Fish and Game committee reported that there would be no change in the present fish and game laws or license fees, which had been mentioned at the sessions of the state legislature recently.

It was also announced that the regular monthly meeting of the Latah County Chambers of Commerce would be held in Genesee this month and that Kendrick would be the host for the April meeting.

Several subjects of interest to the town and community in general were discussed, but no definite action could be taken at this time. There being no further business the meeting adjourned to gather again on April 7—when it is hoped more of the business men of the town will see their duty to be present and take part in the deliberations of the group.
