## WHAT HAPPENED HERE 20 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

Last Sunday night about 11 o'clock the whole town was aroused by a terrible explosion. On investigation it was found that parties had set off dynamite behind the blacksmith shop owned by Billy Meyer. The explosive had evidently been placed in an oil barrel, as pieces of the barrel had been scattered for two blocks around. This was the most vicious hoodlum exploit that has ever taken place in Kendrick. Whenever a crowd of young toughs get together and perpetrate an outrage that endangers the lives of citizens of the town, besides destroying property, it is time to put a stop to it. The dynamite used had been stolen from the Kendrick Highway district a short time ago. Sheriff Woody was in town investigating the affair Tuesday. He secured considerable valuable information and said that if there was a repetition of such actions, arrests would follow. An idea of the extent of the explosion may be gained when it is learned that windows 100 feet away were shattered and pieces of the barrel were driven through the sides of frame buildings.

## CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE TO OBSERVE FORESTRY WEEK

The Latah County Chambers of Commerce will hold their April meeting in Kendrick on the evening of the 28th, and the general public is cordially invited to attend. Word from A. A. Segersten, chairman, stated there will be three well-known speakers for this meeting and they will also have two excellent films. He further announced that Gov. Chase Clark has issued a proclamation that the week of April 27th to May 3rd be set aside and observed as "Forestry Week" in Idaho, and that the meeting and talks will conform to this idea.

Dinner will be served at 6:00 o'clock in the basement of the Community church.

Speakers are: E. R. Edgerton, chairman of the Timber Products bureau of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, who will speak on "Some of the Present Day Problems on Forestry As I See Them From the Civic and Industry Standpoint." C. H. McHarg, assistant regional forester of Missoula, Mont., who will speak on "Progress of Co-operative Forestry in Northern Idaho," and Stanton Ready, deputy state forester of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, who will speak on "The Building of a Strong Forestry Department."

A great deal of valuable information will be presented by these men, but here are a few pertinent figures: For the 2,300,000 acres irrigated in Idaho, 80 per cent of the water is obtained from the forests of the state. The value of the water originating in the forests and measured in crop production, is worth \$135,000,000.

Forest products in tonnage lead the net total of exports in the state. One-eleventh of the water reaching Grand Coulee is from north Idaho; and one-eighth of the water going over Bonneville dam, is from Idaho.

### All University Day, May 3

Thirty-five departments will be represented on the program of all-university day, campus-wide open house and activity show to be held at the University of Idaho on Saturday, May 3.

Feature event for 12 departments of the college of agriculture will be the eighteenth "Little International," student sponsored replica of a big-time livestock show. Morning judging contests, an afternoon parade, and an evening indoor stock show are main events on the day's program.

Forestry students have scheduled the concluding events of their state-wide forestry week that day. These include a meeting of the Inland Empire section of the Society of American Foresters, the annual forester's banquet and the lumbermen's ball.

All five departments of the college of engineering—civil, mechanical, electrical, agricultural and chemical will feature exhibits and demonstrations of their work in an engineers' open house.

Other departments which have planned special activities for all-university day include art and architecture, athletics for men, bacteriology, botany, business administration, chemistry, dramatics, geology, health service, home economics, library, military, mining and metallurgy, music, physics, psychology, women's physical education and zoology.

### A Much-Needed Course

Success beyond all expectation of the unusual course in automobile driver training introduced at the University of Idaho's 1940 summer session has led to its repetition at this year's summer term, June 16 to July 25.

Purpose of the course is to teach physical education instructors the best methods of teaching high school pupils how to drive cars properly and thus reduce the appalling toll of traffic accidents. Recent figures on accidents in various age groups show that 16-year-olds have a driving record over nine times worse, in terms of fatalities, than persons 45 to 50, who had the best record.

The course is made possible through cooperation of the American, Inland, and Idaho automobile associations and the Pontiac Motor company, which again will furnish a dual control car for instruction purposes. J. B. Youngman, Spokane, traffic safety expert, will give the course.

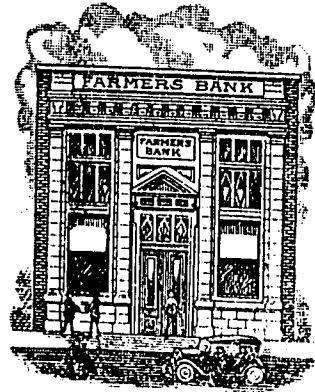

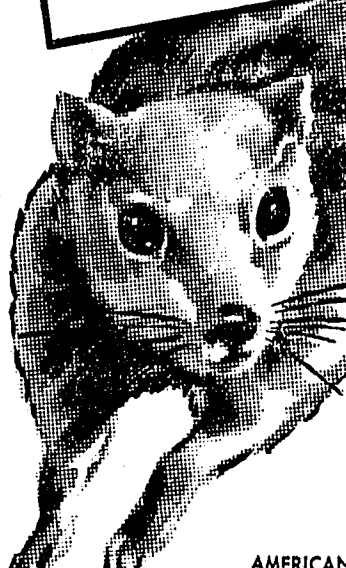

**What About Envelopes**

Records show that envelopes for mailing purposes came into use some time between 1839 and 1849, soon after the adoption of the postage stamp. Previously envelopes were seldom used in the mails because of an extra charge being made for the extra paper. A few such wrappers were used in France for one purpose or another as early as the 17th century. In 1830, in Brighton, England, envelopes were made by a book-seller and stationer named S. K. Brewer.
