It was planned primarily for use by the National Defense Advisory Commission in formulating policies with respect to distribution of vital commodities and the certification of new construction, and by the Commodity Credit Corporation in determining available storage space for grain. All establishments storing wheat, corn, oats, barley, rye, flaxseed, dry beans and peas and seeds were covered by the survey. The establishment included warehouses, elevators, flour and feed mills, breweries, and bean, pea and seed cleaning plants.

Editor's Note: Of the 5,162,000 bushels which Latah County is capable of storing, Kendrick, on the same basis can store 797,000 bushels, or 15.4 per cent of Latah County's total capacity, which, for a town with 463 population, is really something to write home about! It's a fact of which all in this section can well be proud.






