I am sending you a few pictures of this field that were taken last graduation day, the 11th of July. There is a graduation class of flying cadets every five weeks. As I am second cook for the 81st school squadron, I get all I want to eat. There are about 1,900 officers and enlisted men at this field, which will be increased to about 3,000 in two or three months. There are also about 150 advanced training ships, flying day and night.

If anybody is interested in the Air Corps, I would be glad to answer all questions I can.

As I work one day, and am off two, I have plenty of extra time on my hands.

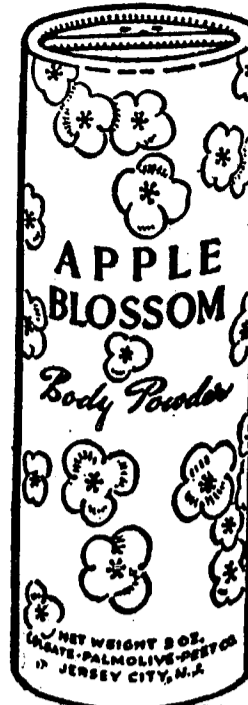

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CHAIRMAN AND THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, LATAH COUNTY, STATE OF IDAHO 1. That there is hereby granted by the Village of Kendrick to the POTLATCH TELEPHONE COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right and privilege to do a general telephone and telegraph business within said Village of Kendrick, and to place, erect, lay, maintain and operate in and under the streets and alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways within the said Village, poles, wires and other appliances, and conductors for the transmission of electricity for telephone and telegraph purposes. Such wires and other appliances and conductors may be strung upon poles or other fixtures above ground, or, at the option of the grantee, its successors and assigns, may be laid underground in pipes or conduits or otherwise protected, and such other apparatus may be used as may be necessary or proper to operate and maintain the same.

There is further given in connection herewith, unto the said POTLATCH TELEPHONE COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right during the life of this franchise to cut and trim any and all trees growing in or over the streets or alleys of said Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, that might or may interfere with any wires, poles, conduits or other apparatus of the said POTLATCH TELEPHONE COMPANY, its successors and assigns, provided that in no case shall any of said trees be cut or trimmed to a height of less than twenty-five (25) feet above the level of the streets or alleys.

The said Grantee, on request of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, shall remove or raise its wires so as to permit the removal of any house or building when the same may be necessary to permit the removal of said building on, over and along the streets, alleys or public highways of the said Village to the point of destination, provided that the party to whom a permit has been granted to remove any such building on, over and along any of the streets or alleys of the said Village of Kendrick, Idaho, shall pay to the Grantee hereunder the cost incurred in removing or changing the wires of the Grantee so as to permit the removal of said building as aforesaid.

The condition of the spring wheat crop in the Canadian Prairie provinces at the close of July was reported at 65 per cent of normal compared with 96 per cent at the middle of June and 82 per cent a year ago.

In Europe, harvesting was about completed in southeastern and southern areas, with yields largely unsatisfactory. Heavy rains interrupted harvesting in western Europe.

In the southern hemisphere, seeding was nearing completion in Argentina, except in Provinces where reseedling was necessary because of green fly damage.
