Registrant May Appeal

Explaining that every registrant is entitled to appeal from qualification by his local board, Brig. Gen. M. G. McConnel, Idaho's director of selective service, outlined the procedure of appeal in a statement issued this week.

Geo. McConnel said that any person entitled to do so may appeal in either of the following ways:

1. By filing with his local board a written notice of appeal. Such notice need not be in any particular form but must state the name of the registrant and the name and identity of the person appealing so as to show the right of appeal.
2. By signing the "Appeal to the Board of Appeal" on the Questionnaire (Form 40).

The person appealing may attach to his notice of appeal, or to his questionnaire, a statement specifying the respects in which he believes the local board erred; may direct attention to any information in the registrant's file which he believes the local board has failed to consider or give sufficient weight; and may set out in full evidence which was offered to the local board and which the local board failed or refused to include in the registrant's file.

Don't Forsake Your Country

"New conquests and boundaries need no erase pride in the old country when a foreign-born registrant answers questions concerning his nativity," according to a statement made today by Brig. Gen. M. G. McConnel, state director of selective service. This comment was prompted by a number of cases where foreign-born registrants have assumed that they were compelled to give the name of the conquering or occupying nation as their country of birth.

"This assumption is wrong and those who have followed it may amend the record through their local board.

By way of example, Gen. McConnel stated that a Czech, filling out his questionnaire since the conquest of his country by Germany, does not have to designate his birth country as Germany. He may record it as Czechoslovakia and a man born in old Poland, may still call himself a Pole.

Lightning Strikes Telephone

The lightning and thunder storm of last week-end did a number of freakish things, but the most freakish was the striking of the telephone wire leading into the Frankie Bencoter home on American ridge.

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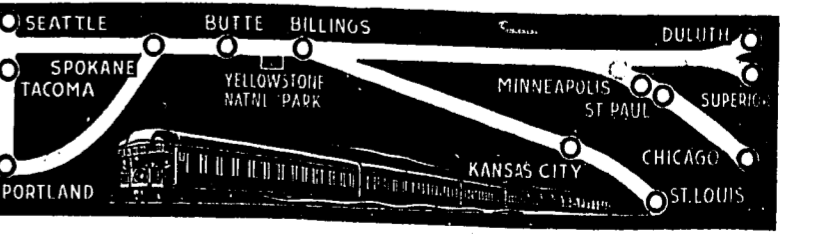
