Trade reports also indicate there has been a steady movement of wheat from this area to mid-Amid the soft glow of lighted western points, mostly to Kansas City during recent weeks. Domestic flour business was reported to have been somewhat less active than during the days imemdiately following the declaration of war. Export flour sales under the indemnity plan were reported very light to central and South America, with no new busi-ness to the Philippines because of war conditions. Indemnity payments held unchanged from those of several weeks ago. Wheat receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals remained very moderate at 403 cars for the week.
