The bride and groom and attendants then entered to the strains of the Lohengrin Wedding March, and took their places in front of a cross covered with evergreens and lighted with blue lights and silver reflectors, flanked with candelabrae bearing eight white tapers each. The bride was given in marriage by her father.

The bride was lovely in a navy blue street-length dress, and carried a corsage of red rose buds, and her mother's family bible. ## New Food Stamp List

Raisins have been removed from the list of foods which may be purchased with Federal Blue stamps during the month of January, Walter F. Willard, local representative for the Surplus Marketing Administration, announces.

The January list for blue stamp buying by eligible families in Idaho remains the same as for December, and includes: Butter, fresh pork (except that cooked or packed in metal or glass containers), fresh grapefruit, pears, apples, oranges, and all fresh vegetables (including potatoes), corn meal, wheat flour, enriched wheat flour and whole wheat (raham) flour, hominy grits, shell eggs, dried prunes, dry edible beans.

The stamp plan is part of the Federal agricultural program which assures farmers an adequate market and enables them to increase production of food crops vital to America's war effort. Likewise, as a measure of civilian defense for 10 million less fortunate Americans, the stamp plan serves in war-time as well as in peace-time to keep up morale and health among these people.

## Celebrate Double Reunion

## CASH WHEAT PRICES REMAIN ALMOST UNCHANGED

Cash wheat prices were somewhat irregular in Pacific Northwestern markets, during the week ending December 26, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The fluctuations moved within narrow ranges and were slightly lower on some classes and slightly higher on others, with some unchanged as compared with the previous week. Price changes mostly depended upon local supply and demand conditions on the various classes and qualities of wheat. The general cash wheat situation continued dull, especially at the close of the period when the usual holiday and pre-inventory lack of buying interest became more pronounced. With most current quotations below loan values, growers have not been pressing wheat for sale, although trade reports indicate sufficient supplies were available for market needs. Mills were reported taking offerings of protein qualities quite readily at firm to higher prices. Trade reports also indicate there has been a steady movement of wheat from this area to mid-western points, mostly to Kansas City during recent weeks. Domestic flour business was reported to have been somewhat less active than during the days immediately following the declaration of war. Export flour sales under the indemnity plan were reported very light to central and South America with no new business to the Philippines because of war conditions. Indemnity payments held unchanged from those of several weeks ago. Wheat receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals remained very moderate at 403 cars for the week.

Cash wheat prices at Portland on December 26 showed soft white at 98c; soft white, no rx, 98c; white club at 99c; western red at 97 1/2c, and hard red winter at 96 1/2c per bushel, all basis No. 1 grade in bulk.

The San Francisco wheat market averaged quiet but held steady. Demand was only moderate during the period but this was offset by light offerings. Central California growers generally were not offering remaining supplies. Bids for No. 1 hard white and No. 1 soft white wheat were made in a wide range of from \$1.75 to \$1.85 per 100, country warehouse receipt basis. Offerings from Pacific Northwestern and Intermountain states continued in fair volume with central California receipts including wheat for both milling and feeding purposes.

The Christmas holiday and inclement weather reduced the marketings of cash wheat at Kansas City rather materially, the week's total aggregating 485 cars against 626 for the previous week. Premiums advanced about 1/4c during the week with the upturn rather general on all classes and types. Prices, as the week closed, were about equal to Federal loan values plus accrued charges on grain sealed at the time the loans on the 1941 crop were made available. Apathy incident to the holiday season was augmented by trade uncertainty over price control legislation and a lapse in the domestic flour trade following the active buying which occurred upon the declaration of war.

Cash wheat prices at Minneapolis underwent some adjustment with the usual somewhat slower mill demand at this time, as mills became more selective and wanted better qualities, lower moisture and higher protein, with poorer lots down about 2c for the week.

Winter wheat made some growth in central and southern portions of the belt as the result of abnormally wet weather. In most areas, fields are largely bare of snow and the semi-dormant condition of the crop would be unfavorable in case of severe cold. Considerable snow occurred in the western wheat belt and precipitation was favorable in the northern Rocky Mountain sections. Wheat was in need of moisture, particularly New Mexico. In general, the winter grain outlook continued favorable.

Little information is available relative to crop conditions in other countries. The weather was unusually mild in Europe, particularly in central and western areas. Crop conditions are reported fairly satisfactory except in sections which suffered losses from extreme cold of last month. No information is available regarding the acreage planted to winter crops in Russia, but a large reduction compared with past years appears certain because of the German occupation of the Ukraine, which is an important winter grain territory. Harvesting is about completed in Australia and trade reports indicate an outturn about up to average.

Harvesting was also well along in Argentina, where the crop is about 25 per cent below the revised estimate for last season. With the surplus for export or carry-over on December 1 placed at 129 million bushels, and a crop of 220,460,000 bushels, a total supply of nearly 350 million bushels will be available for the 1942 season, as compared with about 320 million bushels for 1941.

A material increase in the use of corn in the U. S. A. is in prospect this season, since the 1941 pig crop is 5 1/2 per cent larger than last year's crop and only 2 per cent smaller than the record crop of 1939. The number of pigs saved in the fall season of 1941 is estimated at 35,530,000, a record fall crop. The combined spring and fall pig crops of 1941 totaled 95,075,000 head compared with 79,835,000 head in

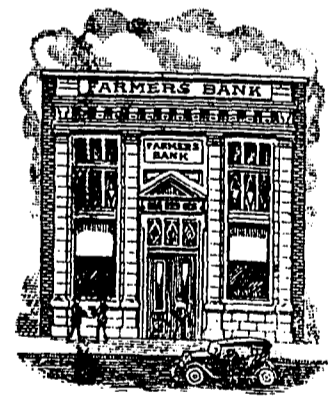

**But Few May Buy Tires**  
 The nation's 32,000,000 motor car owners today faced an almost complete tire famine.

The office of price administration cracked down all the way in a new rationing program, denying the vitally needed rubber not only to the Sunday pleasure driver, but to taxicabs, traveling salesmen and many commercial truckers.

The cut-off of crude rubber from the far eastern plantations may very easily take millions of automobiles — with worn tires — from city street and country highway.

Price Administrator Leon Henderson — cognizant of the needs of the armed forces for a war of nobody knows how long duration — issued regulations for local tire rationing boards which start operation January 5. These regulations ban the issuance of purchasing certificates for new tires or tubes except to those coming within seven distinct classifications.

These are:

1. Physicians, surgeons, visiting nurses, veterinarians.
2. Ambulances.
3. Fire fighting equipment, police vehicles, garbage removal trucks and mail delivery cars.
4. Public service vehicles with a capacity of 10 or more passengers on regular transportation routes, school buses or cars to carry workers to and from industrial plants.
5. Trucks for ice and fuel delivery, road maintenance, public utilities facilities, essential repair services, waste and scrap dealers, common carriers and transportation for raw materials, semi-finished or finished goods which are not moving directly to the household for ultimate consumers' use.
6. Farm tractors or other implements, except trucks or pleasure cars.
7. Industrial, mining and construction equipment, except trucks or other automobiles.

1940. Reports from farmers show more hogs over six months old on farms December 1, than a year ago. An increase of 28 per cent over last spring is indicated in the number of sows to farrow in the spring of 1942, or a record total of 9,974,000 sows. If the indicated farrowings are realized and if the 5-year average number of pigs is saved per litter, the 1942 spring pig crop will be about 62 million head. This would be about 7 million head more than any spring season back to 1924.
