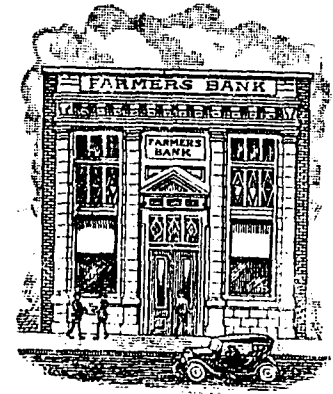

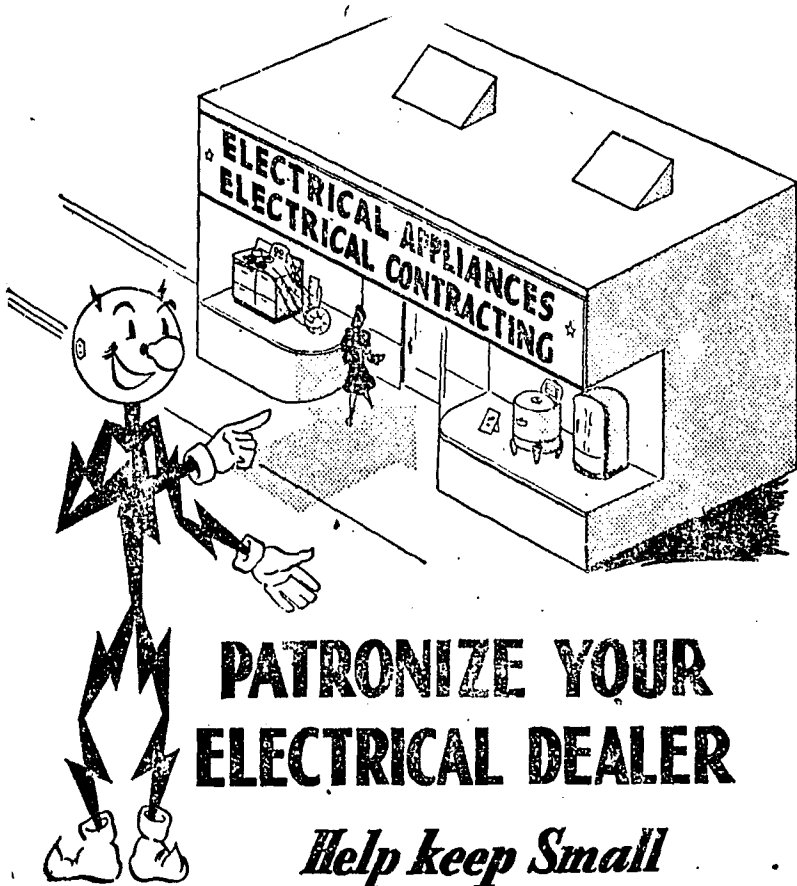

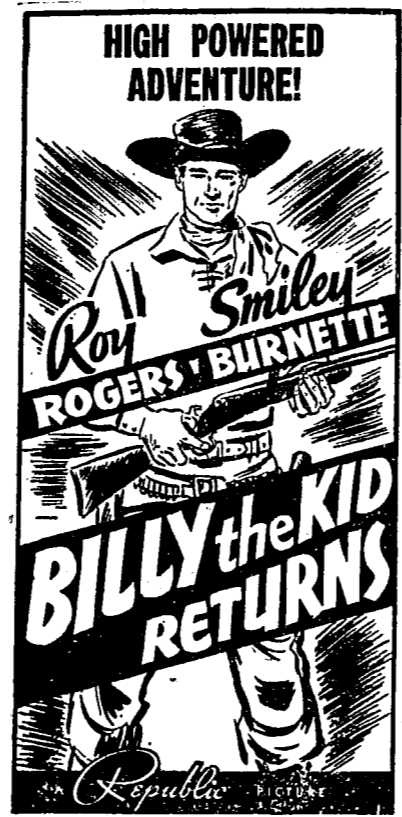

### Roy Long Writes

Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Long are in receipt of a letter from their son, Lieut. Roy Long, who is now stationed in Australia. The letter, however, was written on the boat that took his regiment to Australia, and was written long before the radiotelegram and Mother's Day greeting she received last week. The letter follows:

High Seas

Things have been going along pretty good the last few weeks. I've seen lots of water in that time. One of the most beautiful spots I have seen, however, was Panama. We came through the locks in the day time, which was an advantage for us all. The locks are really something, and the vegetation about the canal is beautiful, all shades of green, light, medium and dark. The colors could not be described by me. The ferns aren't any small matter, either, some being four to four and a half feet tall. Palm trees were something that caught my eye, the ones I saw grew right in the city. The jungles really have the plant growth, and I would hate to be lost in it. Grasses grow two and three feet high, then the trees continue on from there. I didn't see any snakes.

The water supply on the boat is something everybody watches very carefully. We all have a canteen, which holds about a quart. We fill it about once a day, and you would be surprised just what you can do with a quart of water. One day I shaved, took a sponge bath, and had enough to drink for that day! Not bad, is it.

One of the high-lights of the trip so far was the crossing of the equator. It was on a Saturday night and our turn to dance, so I danced across that great line with a little dark-headed nurse. The room was small, with all the windows closed and very little ventilation, for after sundown we close all the windows and port holes for the black-out. Sometimes the boat does lots of rocking.

When we got into southern waters we could see the Southern Cross, a great formation of stars in the heavens. We came upon several big schools of flying fish, and it helps to pass the time away to watch them fly about.

We have some type of music every night. It's one of the high lights of the evening. Music, and southern sunsets are really something to hear and see.

We have crossed the International date line. One morning I woke up and it was Tuesday, and before I knew it — it was Wednesday afternoon. The days are not correct, but it gives you an idea how it works! To give exact days might be valuable information to the enemy.

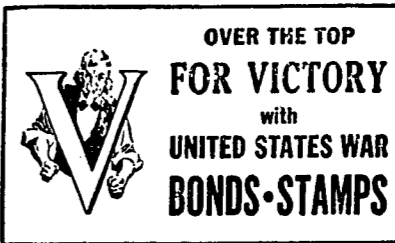

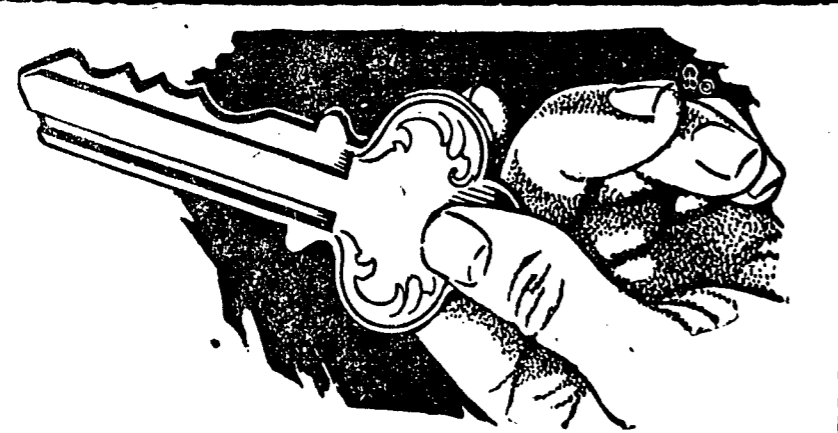
