### THE STORY OF "SILENT NIGHT," HOLY NIGHT

By Donald Stroh

Perhaps one of our best loved of our Christmas songs is the fa-miliar "Silent Night, Holy Night" and yet a very few of those who sing this song know anything about the composer or the story of how it came to be written. The late Madame Ernestine Schumann-Heink, the German singer who was called Mother Schumann-Heink by the soldiers during World War I, sang it so well and so often at Christmas time that she felt it was her own "Stille Nacht," but it was composed by a poor Austrian organist, who drafted it more than a hundred

The music was written by Franz Xaver Gruber in the year 1816. A village priest, Father Josef Mohr, had written the poem for the Christmas season and brought it to Gruber with the request that he write a simple tune for it, one that could

years ago.

be easily remembered.
Gruber sat down and wrote the entire melody to "Stille Nacht" in half an hour; wrote it all in one piece, at a sitting, and never took

time to revise it.
On Christmas Eve in 1818 in the village of Oberdorf, Father Mohr and Gruber introduced the song. It made such an impression that many were the people who went home that night humming the tune. The song was soon spread throughout Ger-many and Austria and then all over Europe and finally reached America for us to sing and enjoy during the best season of the year — Christmas. Franz Gruber was born in Unterweizberg, a small town near Hochberg of Upper Austria, in the year 1796. Early in life he showed promise of being a musician but his father was a wool weaver and the boy was destined to be a wool weaver like his father. When the boy got the chance he would go to church and listen to the music. He was taught reading and writing and the rudiments of music by a school-master in the village. Secretly he practiced on a keyboard of his own invention and startled his parents and friends when he played the mass from memory one Sunday at "BATTLE OF MIDWAY"
