CASH WHEAT PRICES ARE IRREGULAR IN NORTHWEST

Seasonal dullness prevailed in the cash wheat market at Portland at the close of the six-day period ending December 24, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports. Cash wheat prices fluctuated somewhat irregularly according to local supply and demand conditions on the various classes and types. Quotations ranged from unchanged on some classes to slightly lower on others while some types made slight gains.

The general market situation on cash wheat remained rather dull with limited trading despite bids by dealers at country points several cents over the government loan values on some classes of grain. Receipts of wheat at Portland amounted to 124 cars for the past six days against 98 cars last week. Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals, including Portland, received 476 cars of wheat compared with 490 cars during the previous week. Demand for wheat from mills was reported only moderate to light because of the relationship between flour ceilings and cash wheat quotations. All sales of wheat to midwestern markets tapered off materially this week as compared with a week ago, according to trade reports. Flour sales for export under the indemnity plan were extremely light from the Pacific Northwest this week, and no sales of wheat under the recently announced subsidy plan to the Americas have been reported from this area. Sales of feed wheat continue of good volume in Northwest markets, principally by the C. C. C. For the most part, new domestic flour business was reported light.

Prices for cash wheat at Kansas City were only moderately changed. Premiums remained unchanged on the lower grades but were reduced in the neighborhood of 1c on the higher types. Demand from milling interests was rather inactive, due to their inability to purchase cash wheat for profitable milling at the present flour ceiling prices. Storage and warehouse interests were again very active buyers as recent heavy movements have further depleted warehouse stocks. Arrivals at Kansas City totaled 533 cars for the 5-day period, but outbound movement was sharply increased, which further reduced public elevator stocks approximately 1,000,000 bushels, leaving a remaining total on December 24 of 36,053,000 bushels.

School Plans Moving Forward

The main purpose of this school is to help rural people in getting their machinery in good repair to enable them to meet production goals during the coming year.

There will be no fees charged to those who wish to attend. Robert Clemmengen has been chosen as instructor for this course, which will be the major repair of farm motors, tractors, combines, grain drills, and any other farm equipment that may need re-conditioning or minor repair work.

School will be held for five hours per day — 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and 1:00 p. m. to 3:00 p. m. of each day.

If you are interested in this course or have machinery that needs repair you are asked to get in touch with your community chairman, which are as follows:

These chairmen will meet with the local group, George Brocke and L. W. Mason, and work out a schedule so that all may be cared for.

YOUNG MEN SHOULD STAY IN COLLEGE UNTIL CALLED

"Stay in college till you are called, which for many of you will be a semester or even a year or two hence," President H. C. Dale wrote all University of Idaho men students at their homes this week.

In relating this official advice he pointed out that the new war manpower commission has taken the same stand on the matter of withdrawing from school as other governmental agencies took after Pearl Harbor and after the lowering of the draft age. That advice still stands: Stay where you are until you are called.

While the war department speaks of calling some members of the enlisted reserve corps to "active duty" this phrase apparently does not mean combat duty, but rather a transfer from reserve status (civilian standing, no pay or subsistence) to "active status," that is uniform, military discipline, army pay and subsistence.

For many, perhaps most, men in the enlisted reserve corps and in navy V-1 and V-7, and marine corps and coast guard reserves this probably means that an officer of the University military department will be detailed to induct into active service men who will merely continue on in the university and who will receive their education and training as members of the armed forces and at government expense. In short, a call to "active duty" apparently does not necessarily mean termination of university training. Members of the enlisted reserve corps who withdrew from the university are of course, liable to immediate call.

Men not now in the various reserves will also, it seems, be inducted and given a chance to continue in the university immediately or after a period of military training, pursuing courses offered by the regular university faculty in special subjects such as mathematics, physics, elementary meteorology, foreign languages, chemistry, elementary engineering, etc.
