Curtis was directed to show cause at a hearing March 15 why he should not instead publish the senior citizens' grant act approved by Idaho voters at the general election last November.

## COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING INTERESTING; FEW PRESENT

The regular monthly meeting of the Kendrick Commercial club was held in the Ag. room of the school house Monday evening of this week, with L. S. Thurber, president, presiding.

Following the delicious 6:30 dinner, served by girls of the Homemaking Department, the regular business of the evening was taken up, but due to the absence of Frank Abrams, secretary, no Minutes were available and no bills read, so committee reports were called for.

Wade Keene, reporting for the Agricultural committee, reported that too much snow and ice still lay on the fields for farmers to ascertain freezing damage to winter wheat, but that there seemed no doubt but what all winter barley had been smothered.

Frank Harris of the Industrial committee reported the local creamery in need of more cream, since the demand for "Polatch Chief" dairy products was growing by leaps and bounds. He further stated that after butter production reached 12,000 pounds per month, 30 per cent of total production must be set aside for the government. However, the local creamery was not yet producing that much, and was not affected by the order.

Roy Ramey, of the entertainment committee brought up the matter of the annual entertainment of the High school basketball team, and after some discussion a committee consisting of Mr. Ramey, H. C. Schupfer, E. A. Deobald and W. L. McCreary was appointed to arrange an entertainment of some sort, preferably a dance, in their honor, and to set a date for the same.

Mr. Stroth, of the Music department, reported a free will offering of approximately \$21.00 was received at the band concert some two weeks ago.

Mr. Kelley reported the organization of the boys 4-H club was progressing nicely, and that some 30 had enrolled. Approximately 15 of these are raising beef stock, and a lesser number milking stock. Some other projects are also under way.

George Brocke of the Merchants committee reported that he believed a businessmen-farmers meeting should be held in the near future to discuss store hours, formation of a local labor-pool, and like items. After considerable round-table discussion it was decided to ask one or more farmers from each ridge to meet with the club at its next meeting and lay plans for the coming summer — and at which meeting further details of government suggestion would be available.

## KENDRICK GOES GOOD IN DISTRICT TOURNAMENT

The Kendrick High School Tigers showed good form and good basketball to get into the semi finals at the District Basketball Tournament that day, so played Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The tournament opened on Wednesday, but Kendrick drew a bye that day, so play Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Opening game of the tournament in the "B" class saw Grangeville defeat Troy, 31-30 and Craigmont beat Pierce 33-23.

In the second day's play (Thursday) Kamiah and Troy were eliminated. Troy by Pierce and Kamiah by Kendrick. A resume of the two Kendrick games of last Thursday follows:

Trailing 18-9 going into the final quarter, Kendrick's cagers put on an almost unbelievable story-book finish to their game with Lapwai as they came back to tie the score and win 26-24 in the over-time session. Baker of Kendrick made the tying score, 24-24 and laid in the field goal that won the ballgame in the over-time period.

It was Ozzie Kanikkeberg who put Kendrick back in the lists as he fought for the ball, intercepted passes, and began hitting long one-handers and set shots from beyond the foul circle in the fourth frame. Kanikkeberg made 10 to lead the winners, collecting eight of them in the last big quarter.

Webb of Lapwai, a tall, speedy guard, who broke fast under the basket, was the game's high scorer with 11 counters, and Greene, Lapwai forward, with his long one-handers, made 10. Baker made six for Kendrick, all in the final quarter, and Bob Fraser tallied six for the winners.

It seemed to be Lapwai's game all the way until the final quarter, as they led 7-4 at the quarter, 11-9 at the half and 18-9 at the end of the third frame. Kanikkeberg put Kendrick back in the ballgame with two quick field goals to open the final quarter, one a layup after he intercepted a Lapwai pass. However, at the midpoint Lapwai still enjoyed a 23-17 lead. Then Kanikkeberg hit a long two-hander, Baker slipped one through, and McCall, Kendrick center, made a free throw good to make the 23-24 for Kendrick. Webb got Lapwai's final point from the foul line and the overtime period began.

Piling up a 9-5 first quarter lead after Kamiah had scored the initial two points, Kendrick's quintet led all the way to defeat the Kubs in the first game Thursday morning 30-24. A couple of quick baskets by Kamiah's Hi Moffet half way in the second quarter moved the Kubs to 13-14, but Ozzie Kanikkeberg, Kendrick forward hit two long set shots to put Kendrick in front 18-13 at the half.

Walt McCall, Kendrick center was the game's high scorer with eight counters, and Bob Fraser, forward, made seven. For Kamiah, it was Drake, center, who fouled out at the close of the third period and Moffet, little Indian lad, who shared scoring honors with seven each. Baker, Kendrick, played a sweet backboard game.

The Kubs again threatened at the start of the third period as Drake converted a free throw and Davis slipped in two points from under the basket to move Kamiah 16-18. McCall, however, got two for Kendrick and Fraser hit another to make it 24-16 for the winners before Frank of Kamiah made a field goal and a free throw to give the Kubs 19. The Cougars stretched their lead to 17-10 halfway through the second frame, but Kendrick moved to 13-17 before D. Clovis of Craigmont hit a field goal and free throw to give Craigmont 20.

In the third frame Kendrick again came within four points of the Cougars as Ozzie Kanikkeberg hit a long two-hander and made a gift toss good to make the score 22-18. Three quick baskets by Craigmont, however, gave them a fat lead. Kendrick scored four more counters to make the score at the end of the period 28-22 for Craigmont. The Cougars made six, Kendrick five in the final frame.

Don Berry, Cougar center, starting his first game of the meet, led in scoring with 12 points. Baker made 10 for Kendrick and Kanikkeberg counted nine. Twelve fouls were charged to Craigmont and nine to Kendrick. No one left the game on personals.

### LYN FOX MEETS KIN, GOES ON RABAU RAID IN PACIFIC

Mrs. Sam Bigham brought us the following dispatch, taken from the San Francisco Call-Bulletin of February 23, which concerns her son-in-law, Lieut. Col. C. Lyn Fox and his son-in-law, Lieut. Robert Fuller of Atherton, Calif.

United Nations Headquarters, New Guinea, Feb. 23 — Well, sir, there are ways—and ways—of celebrating a family reunion. You can kill the fatted calf, or . . . you can kill some skinny Japs. Lieut. Col. C. Lyn Fox of San Francisco and his son-in-law, Lieut. Robert Fuller of Atherton, Cal., took the second choice when they came face to face in a surprise meeting in New Guinea.

They went together on a raid to Rabul (and did they have fun!) — something this man's army agrees is right, fitting and proper when members of a fighting family join forces.

Col. Fox, who before being called into active service, was editorial writer of the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, was unaware of the presence of his son-in-law in New Guinea when he came to this island. When they met, the first thing the colonel could think of was to express the wish that he could fly with the lieutenant, who is a flying fortress pilot.

Fuller grinned. "You'd better," he said, "come along with us to Rabul tonight and we'll have a real celebration."

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
