Slowly a supply vessel steams by a beach-head. The tide is in shore and men wait on the sands. Flour is coming in, from Big Bend and Palouse wheat milled in the Inland Empire. Packed in air-tight, fifty pound tins, then crated in wood and bound with wire, the flour is dumped into the sea to float to the waiting men on shore.

More than 100,000 additional kilowatts to speed victory have resulted. Manpower, strategic materials and fuel for steam generating plants have been conserved.



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
