Somewhere In The Pacific
August 20, 1943

Dear Mac and Bill:

Just a few lines to let you know that I'm receiving your paper regularly and am very glad to get it. News from home is always interesting, and your paper has lots of it.

I'm on one of the islands down here, and life is pretty dull. The natives are very friendly and we get lots of fresh fruit and souvenirs from them. However, Hollywood has the wrong slant on these beautiful tropical islands. They are beautiful, all right, but the mosquitoes and ants are awful. A couple of the

boys put olive oil on their hair last evening, and the ants kept them awake all night. All in all though, life is rather pleasant here. We can go swimming every day in the river about a mile away, and it's just about perfect for the purpose. The heat here is also much easier to bear than the cold of New Zealand.

It's our sincere wish that some of those zoot-suit rioters and strikers of all kinds in the states could see a little action down here. I'll guarantee that an increase in production would result.

Hoping to receive more issues of your paper in the near future, and to be able to thank you for them personally some day, I remain,

Dear Friends:

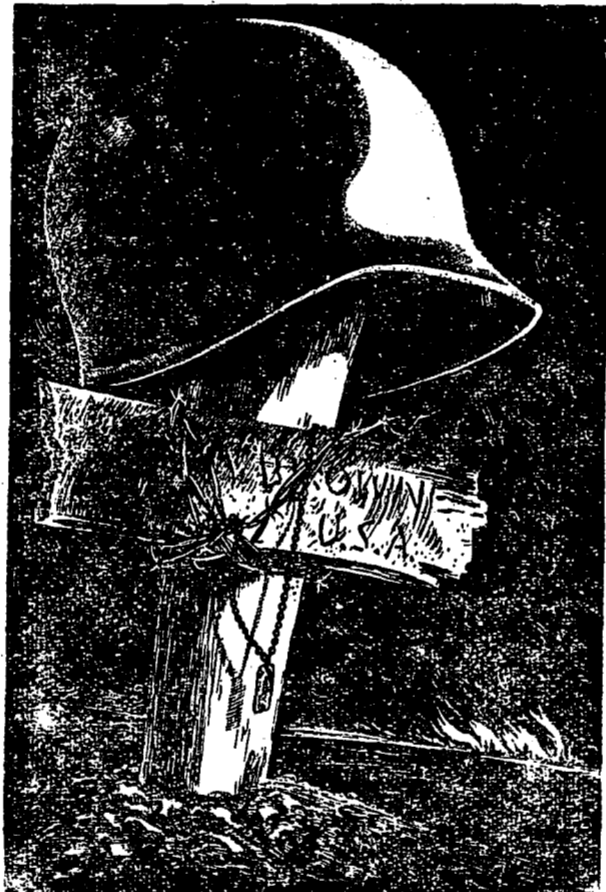

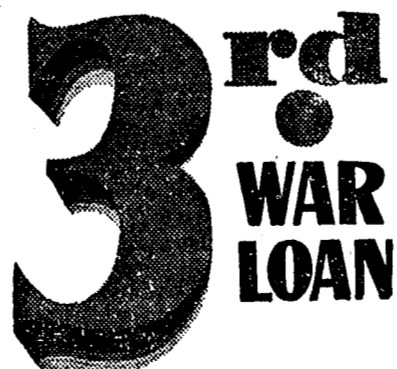
