

Take care of your eggs. Keep them cool and deliver them often. One hour in the hot sun for eggs is as bad as one week in a cool place. Remember, a bad egg is like a bum joke — it smells bad after it is "broke"

So deliver eggs often, keep them cool and protected while in a car or truck, and when you bring yours in, stop and get the neighbors. He will appreciate the favor and the boys on the fighting fronts will also appreciate it for eggs are definitely a "Food For Victory."

Cream, too, is a "Food For Victory," for it provides the butter which forms a vital part in the diet of our fighting men. So always care for it the very best possible. The saying goes: "Care for your car for your country." Rather, let's put it this way: "Care for your cream and eggs for your country!"






