Somewhere In Sicily  
Sept. 29, 1943

Dear Editors:  
Just received my second copy of your paper since I arrived here in Sicily, so will take this opportunity to tell you just how much I appreciate it. It makes one feel considerably closer to home when you can sit down and read what's taking place on the Potlatch.

We've seen lots of country since we came overseas. While in Africa we traveled overland from Casablanca to Bjuto. We never got over being amazed at the natives and their customs. We were quite close at one time, to the city of Sidi-Bel-Affes. It is the original home of the French Foreign Legion and quite a large garrison is still maintained there, or was at the time we were there.

Since coming to Sicily we've traveled over the central part of the island, and are now camped in a position close enough to the Mediterranean so that we can enjoy an occasional swim. We've been through several of their larger cities and were at one time quite close to Mt. Etna.

I didn't expect to solo for several days yet, but yesterday the instructor got out of the plane and said: "It's all yours." I was so surprised that I didn't have a chance to get scared. I felt a lot, lot better after I had gotten the plane and myself down on the ground again in one piece.

In one of the last Gazettes I noticed that an "obstacle course" had been laid out at the school. The army believes in plenty of exercise and lots of running. Keep it hot, boys!

I really enjoy the Gazette. It's very interesting to know what's going on at home and what the other fellows in the service have to say. So thanks a million for the paper.
