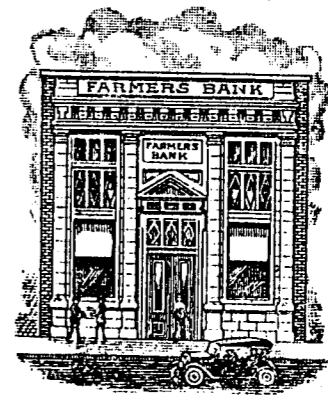

Dinner "trimmings" of all kinds are selling well.



WORD FROM LOCAL MEN IN OUR ARMED FORCES

Marvin Silflow arrived Thursday night of last week, and his brother, Emil, arrived Wednesday, both coming from Fort Knox, Kentucky, where they were attending the Armored Forces school.

Marvin had a 15-day leave and will return to Fort Knox, while Emil has an extra 10-day delay enroute to Camp Beale, Calif., where he will report to continue his mechanics course.

Both boys look "in the pink" of physical condition, but both say that "Mom's cooking and the beds at home are mighty swell." They say they find their training courses interesting, and believe there are much worse branches of the service.

Mm 2-c Harvey (Hobbs) Thornton called at the Gazette office Friday to thank all concerned for the paper, and while here told us considerable about the "Aleutians, the birthplace of storms," and Hobbs says that certainly is no exaggeration. He says that he has seen winds of 100-mile velocity, which would literally lift anything not solidly anchored to the ground and whirl it about. He states that in their ship repair work, of which he had a good share, the workers had to be lashed to their "bos'n chairs" and to the ships themselves in order to remain in any one spot. Covers of canvas or any other type were impossible, so the work was done — rain or storm — for it had to be done. He further stated that in the 18 months he was in the Aleutians there was but 10-days of sunshine.

Hobbs stated that, one ship on which he was stationed was credited with the sinking of a Jap submarine. It seems that there were three boats in the patrol, and a pattern of depth charges were dropped, the big oil slick falling to the credit of his boat, although the submarine was not blown to the surface. Hobbs said that the pattern of depth charges literally "lifted the face of the sea" for hundreds of square yards, and that dead fish appeared by the thousands.

Hobbs stated that he and his buddy acquired a Japanese diary and some pictures from the Attu and Kiska section — but lost them when military intelligence heard of it. He said they might get them back, but doubted it.

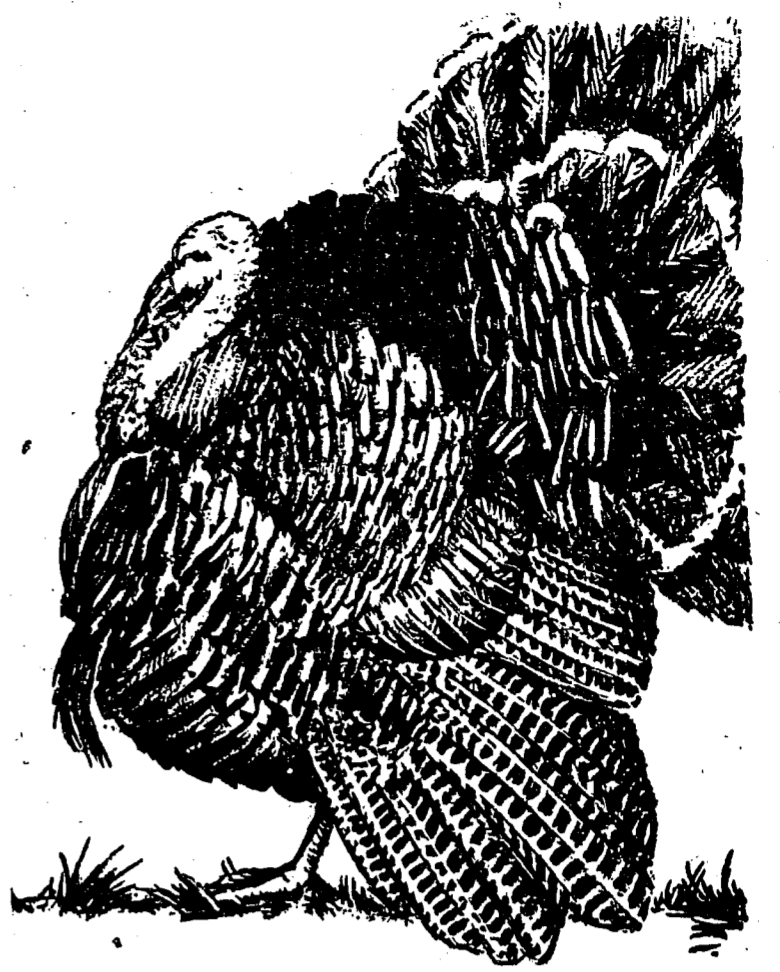
