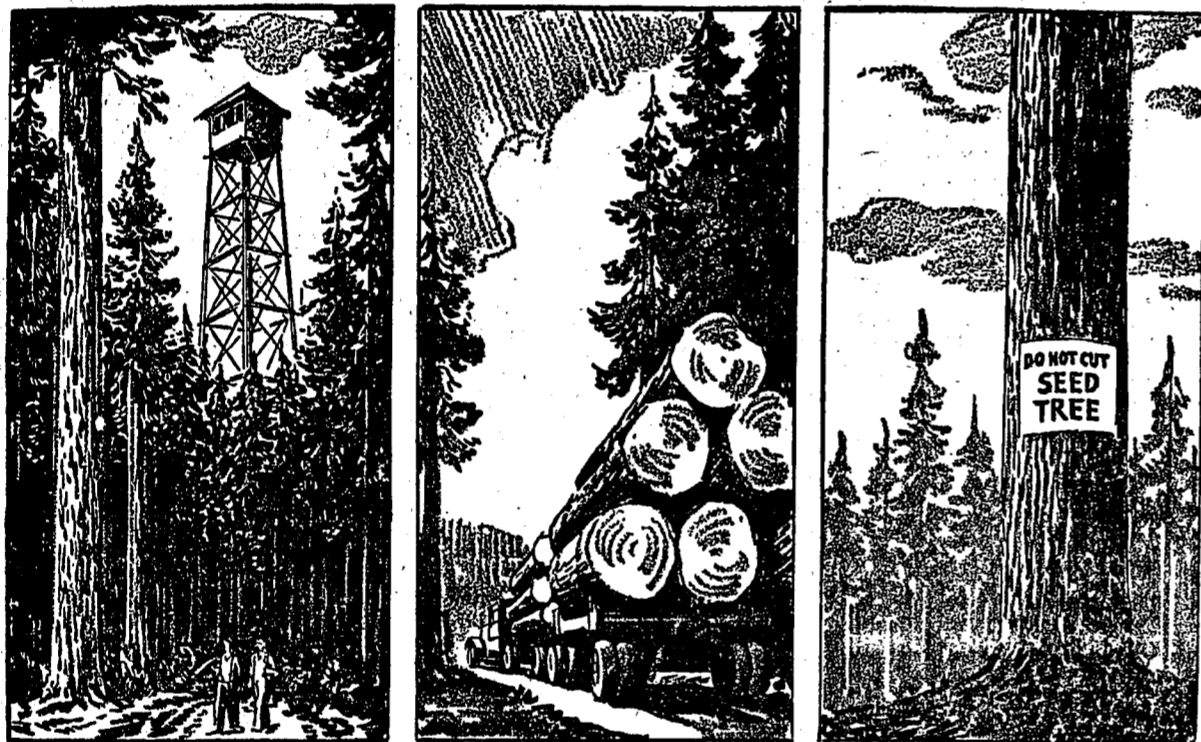

 Well, at last I got around to writing for the paper. In the brief period that I have been in the army I have been in four camps. It was hardly worth while to send for the paper before, but at last I have an address that will be the same for at least three months.

I am here at Chanute Field, taking a course in aircraft sheet metal. I was eliminated from any army flying duty because of my eyes, but at least I can work on planes. When I was in Civilian Pilot training some of the fellows from around home envied me, but now it's my turn to envy the ones of them that are flying now. I would give anything if my eyes were better so I could get into the Cadets, but I guess it can't be helped.

The course I am taking here will last at least 13 weeks. After that we will be eligible for a ten-day furlough or delays en-route. I hope nothing happens so that we won't get them.

Well, I guess that's all for now. Thanking you in advance for the paper.

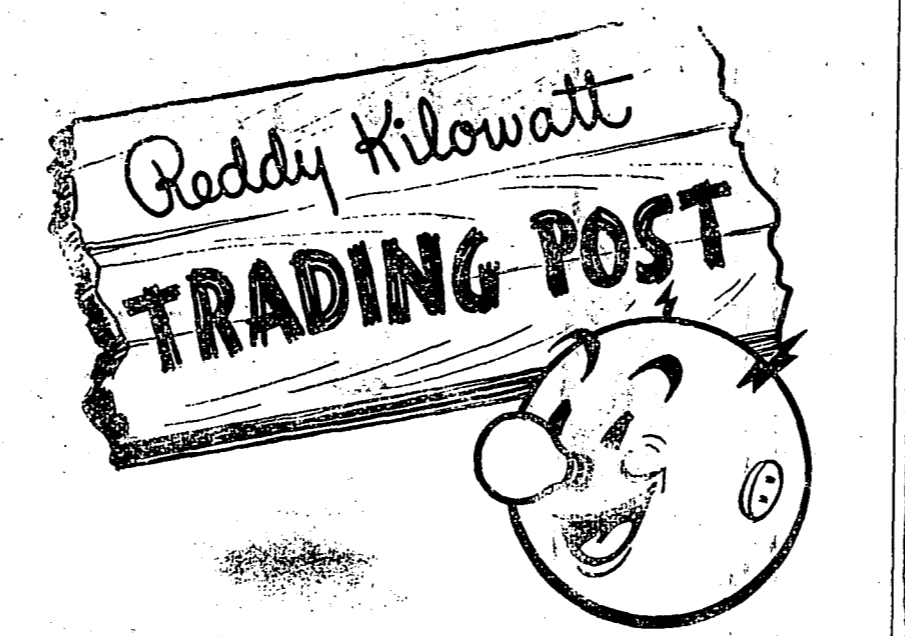
