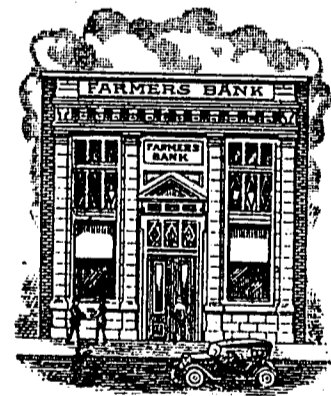

Pay High Taxes
The Washington Water Power Company paid \$9,539.57 in taxes on its real and personal property in Latah county, Monday, December 20, according to C. R. Hunter, district manager for the electric service company.

Checks for the taxes — representing payment of first half taxes for 1943 — were handed to Leola R. King, county tax collector, and Wallace Taylor, assessor of Latah county, by Mr. Hunter. Payment of the taxes for the second half of 1943 will be made in June.

Eight other counties — Clearwater, Bonner, Benewah, Idaho, Kootenai, Lewis, Nez Perce and Shoshone — also received tax payment checks Monday. Total amount of the taxes paid the counties last Monday was \$117,919.75.

The Washington Water Power Company's total real and personal property taxes for the nine Idaho counties for the year 1943 is \$235,717.23. In addition to these taxes the company also annually pays more than \$100,000 in other taxes to the state of Idaho.

Tightening Up On Non-Fathers
Local Selective Service Boards are tightening up on non-fathers, lessening the number of agricultural and occupational deferments for them and at the same time increasing the number of these deferments for pre-war fathers, it was revealed by a comparison of local board reports from October 1 to December 1 by Selective Service national headquarters. Total deferments in agriculture, December 1, were 1,606,661, of which 692,252 were fathers. This was an increase of 33,674 agriculturally deferred fathers between October 1 and December 1. Selective Service figures it will be required to furnish between 1,900,000 and 2,100,000 men to the Armed Forces between December 1 of this year and July 1 of 1944 — thus providing 700,000 to 900,000 replacements and bringing the total strength of all forces, including Waves and Wacs, to 11,300,000.

During October and November an estimated 150,000 men were reclassified out of 4-F for reexamination by the Armed Forces.

Many Arrested In November
Forty-one arrests during November were reported to the fish and game department by conservation officers. Arrests were made in 21 counties of the state. There were 40 convictions, one defendant being found not guilty in court.

Violations of federal regulations for the hunting of ducks and geese led the list with eight arrests. Two were compound offenses in which shooting after sunset with a rifle was alleged.

Seven persons were charged with hunting out of season. Six were arrested for hunting with improper license. Other violations were the illegal possession of deer, five; fishing closed waters and possessing too many pheasants, four each; killing moose, shooting pheasants out of season and illegal trapping of fur, two each; and fishing without a license, one. In three of the deer cases, hunting with artificial light was charged.

Only one of the arrests was in Latah county.

Bounty Paid On Many Heads
Bounty on 50,000 magpies and crows was paid by the Idaho fish and game department in 1943, according to a news dispatch. Most of the predatory birds on which the fee was paid were magpies.

Fewer heads were turned in this year than in recent years, the dispatch said. The reduction was believed to have been caused by the shortage of boy-power and ammunition. Many youngsters who have campaigned against magpies have found other employment at greater financial returns.

Organized sportsmen sponsored the work in several counties as usual. They paid the bounties and were reimbursed by the game department. The rate was 3c a head during the early spring and 2c later. Three cents per head will be paid in 1944.

Destruction of magpies and crows is encouraged because of their damage to game, song and insectivorous birds.

Madison county destroyed most in 1943. Reports to the game department showed bounty paid on 13,103.

Hurrah For Arizona
Phoenix, Ariz. — Clocks throughout Arizona will be turned back one hour after the first stroke of the New Year.

Governor Sidney P. Osborn has issued a proclamation ordering the state back to pre-war mountain standard time, effective at 12:01 a. m., January 1.
